By United Press NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Bullish sentiment received strong encouragement from the action of the Bank of England in reducing its rediscount rate to 4 per cent from 4 1/2 per cent.

Disipation of this apprehension was reflected in the strong tone of the general list in the early dealings after a rather irregular opening.

Steel, American Can, Mack Trucks and other industrial leaders scored good gains on the initial transactions.

Additional stimulus was imparted to the recovery in the general list by the assessment of new money to 5 1/2 per cent in the late morning compared with the renewal rate of 5 1/4 per cent.

EDGAR A. BROWN, FORMER JUDGE, DIES AT HOME

Funeral Services for Prominent Attorney to Be Held Saturday.

Edgar A. Brown, 77, former Circuit Judge, died early today at his home in the Stuyvesant Apts., 3340 N. Meridian St., after an illness of four months.

Mr. Brown was born in Lenox, Ohio, coming to Indiana shortly after the Civil War, as a teacher in a seminary at Centerville, Ind.

Mr. Brown was a Republican until 1880, when he became a Democrat on the tariff issue.

Edgar A. Brown, former Circuit Judge, was a member of the Century Club and the First Congregational Church.

He is survived by the widow, his second wife, and five children, George R. Brown and Mrs. Christopher B. Coleman of Indianapolis.

Funeral services will be held at the home of Mrs. Coleman, 4315 Central Ave., Saturday, at 2 p. m., in charge of Rev. William L. Caughran of the First Congregational Church.

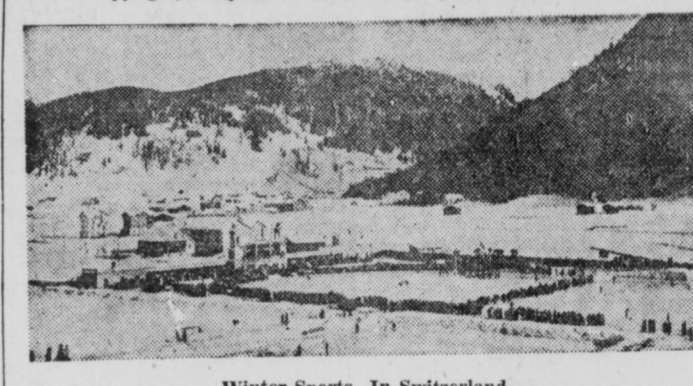
