Ascribes Longevity Partially to Cold Baths.

KENOSHA, Wis., Oct. 2.—The oldest politician in the country is Mrs. Louisa K. Thiers, who observed her 11th birthday anniversary today.

Mrs. Thiers was born in Whiteboro, N. Y., in 1814. Until women were granted the franchise she cared not a whit for politics. But since, she has voted regularly and takes a keen interest in public affairs, she said.

One of Mrs. Thiers' aversions is hot baths. She has never liked them since the first one she took gave her a headache.

Until she was 100 Mrs. Thiers took a cold bath every morning. She still takes cold baths, but less frequently. They are one of her regimen for longevity.

The others are plenty of sleep, light clothing in winter, regular meals of plain food, fresh air and exercise and activity.

GAS TAX SHOWS GAIN

Year's Total More Than \$2,000,000

In Excess of Previous Period.

Gasoline tax collections for the fiscal year which ended Sept. 30 totaled \$6,802,481.72, more than \$2,000,000 in excess of collections for the previous business year, according to Archie N. Bobbitt, State gasoline tax collector.

The cent increase in the tax was partly responsible for the gain, although 40,579,795 more gallons of gasoline were used this year than last. During the fiscal year just closed 274,660,810.6 gallons were consumed. Total collections for September, 1925, were \$884,160.71.

EUROPEAN GEM THIEF HUNTED

Jewelry Valued at \$500,000

Is Stolen.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—An European thief who followed two rose

pink pearls across the Atlantic was hunted today in the theft of jewelry variously valued at from \$500,000 to \$750,000, from Mrs. James P. Donahue, daughter of the late Frank W. Woolworth, 5 and 10-cent store founder.

Police Commissioner Richard Enright took direct control of the case, upon which a large force of detectives, including city, hotel and insurance company agents, have been investigating.

The fact that the two largest pearls in one of the necklaces stolen

from the Donahue suite in the Hotel Plaza had arrived from Paris only twenty-four hours before the robbery, led police to believe that the jewels had been followed from abroad.
