

## DUVALL SAYS WOMEN WILL BE APPOINTED

Republican Nominee Sounds  
Keynote of Fall Campaign.

Promises of a number of changes from the present manner of ruling Indianapolis, if he is elected mayor, were made by John L. Duvall, Republican nominee for mayor, in his keynote address delivered before a large crowd in Broad Ripple Tuesday night.

Duvall pledged himself to appoint a "goodly number of women in the ranks of city officials," to conduct a survey to ascertain useless city offices and to abolish them, to take the police and fire departments out of politics and appoint a chief of police "familiar with law enforcement" and to install a thorough and effective budget system.

The Republican nominee said he

had decided to read his speech "for fear of the danger of being misquoted."

The meeting was held in old-time style. Flaring torches burned from the telegraph poles while Roman candles and fireworks informed the residents of the north side there was something doing politically in the Roll Inn garage, where the meeting was held, in place of the Duvall home, because of the inclement weather.

### No Special Privileges

"I will be mayor in fact as well as in name," Duvall declared. "No man or group of men who seek special privileges at the expense of taxpayers will influence me. If elected as your mayor, I shall be mayor of all the people, regardless of race, color or creed."

Duvall announced he would refrain from personalities during the coming campaign.

Disclaiming intention of expounding "fads or fancies," Duvall paid tribute to President Coolidge, declaring that "the common sense of Calvin Coolidge is what we need in city government."

The Republican nominee paid special attention to the historical development of Indianapolis, recounting the city's progress from frontier

settlement to a metropolis with 450 miles of improved streets.

### On Street Assessments

In connection with street improvements, Duvall said he opposed assessing destructively for street improvements the poor property owner, who is paying for his home.

Duvall said the machinery of law enforcement must be readjusted and the police must know how to catch criminals.

He recounted his own record as treasurer of Marion County and his twenty years in business here.

"I believe the same principles that apply in business can be utilized in managing the affairs of the city of Indianapolis," Duvall declared.

Singing of "Lumber-Lungsed Lew" by the quartet of the Indianapolis Drum Corps, which provided music during the program, aroused one of the high points of enthusiasm of the meeting.

### Some Political "Harmony"

"Let's have goodby Lew and Bill Armistage too," a member of the audience shouted and the political vocal harmony was on.

Alvah J. Rueker, attorney, who presided, predicted a majority of 35,000 for Duvall.

"The G. O. P. candidates for council and the office of city clerk spoke briefly. John T. Sauter, introduced the Republican nominee.

## COMPROMISE ON TAX CONSIDERED

Officials Seek Counsel on  
Pension Levy Status.

With officials of the State tax board seeking counsel of Attorney General Arthur L. Gilliom on the true status of the Indianapolis police and firemen's pension fund levies, trustees of the funds today were understood to be considering a compromise with the city administration on 1-cent levies for 1926.

The tax board also asked Gilliom for an opinion as to legality of the city sanitary levy, increased from 5.5 cents to 6.5 cents by the city council, over Mayor Shank's veto. The board Tuesday heard an appeal against the increased sanitary levy and a three-sided argument on the pension fund levies, now 1/2-cent each.

The tax board took the two matters under advisement, also postponing action on an appeal from the \$1.25 levy for Perry Township, Marion County.

## BAND'S PLANS ALREADY MADE

Bailey Says He Has Promised  
One Appointment.

"Well, what has that to do with the next administration?" asked Fire Chief John J. O'Brien.

375 Murders This Year,  
Justice Reveals.

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—With 325 killings in Chicago since the first of the year, Chief Justice Thomas Lynch of Criminal Court today transferred five more judges to criminal benches to help speed up the prosecution of gunmen.

Eventually there will have to be twenty permanent judges in the Criminal Court to handle prosecutions resulting from the rapid crime wave, Judge Lynch said.
