

INQUEST BEGUN IN KILLING BY BANDIT VICTIM

Pawn Shop Proprietor to Be Exonerated for Shooting Hold-up Man.

Inquest into the death of a colored bandit, Wednesday, expected to exonerate Sam Dorfman, 34, proprietor of a pawn shop at 361 Indiana Ave., was begun today by Coroner Paul F. Robinson.

The colored man, with his accomplice, also colored, who gave his name as Lucius West, alias John Green, 19, of Birmingham, Ala., held up Dorfman in his shop. After striking Dorfman over the head several times with the butt end of his revolver, the bandit wrestled with Dorfman for several minutes on the floor. Dorfman took the bandit's gun and shot him through the stomach.

The dead man is said to be Sam Langford, of New Orleans, La. He gave police several names before his death. Positive identification will not be established until word is received from Ohio State prison by Bert Perrott Bertillon expert.

West said he met Langford at the Ohio prison, from which both are paroled. He is held on charges of

Bravery of Sam Dorfman, who Wednesday fatally wounded a colored bandit who held him up in his pawnshop at 361 Indiana Ave., was praised today by Police Chief Herman F. Rikhoff.

Dorfman shot the bandit as they tussled together on the floor. Dorfman was beaten over the head and had his wounds dressed at the city hospital.

"If more hold-up victims would fight as Dorfman did, the bandit toll in Indianapolis would dwindle," Rikhoff said.

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G. O. P. Song Is Not Liked at City Hall

Leaders Protest Singing of 'Limber-Lunged Lew' Melody.

"Limber Lunged Lew." It was only a lifting melody sung by a quartet at the meeting in Broad Ripple, where John L. Duvall, Republican nominee for mayor, delivered his keynote address, but it had a wicked kick.

The kick was felt at the city hall today, and it well nigh knocked the enthusiasm out of the hall politicians who had believed themselves firmly located on the G. O. P. band wagon.

"The song was a violation of good taste and an insult uncalled for to Mayor Shank, a local Republican," said William H. Freeman, board of works member.

John F. Rainier, assessment bureau head, was in Shank's office to assure him the melody was not authorized. Other city hall leaders said they heard Duvall had called a meeting of speakers and warned them to refrain from offending the present administration.

"Nothing to Do With It" nothing to do with making the arrangements for the meeting," Duvall said.

Mayor Shank expressed indifference at the affront to his administration.

"If they believe singing that song will get votes for them, let them keep it up," he commented.
