Funeral services for Richard Bird, 11, of 2525 Broadway, son of Mrs. Florence and Warren M. Bird, were held Monday at 2:30 p.m. at the Episcopal Church of the Advent, Thirty-Third and Meridian Sts. Burial in Crown Hill cemetery.

Bird was knocked from his bicycle at Twenty-Fifth St. near Broadway by an automobile driven by William Gill, 33, of 1158 Eugene St. Gill was slated on a charge of involuntary manslaughter by Coroner Paul F. Robinson, who made an investigation of the accident following the boy's death at the St. Vincent's Hospital Saturday.
