

## INDIANA GROUP AT CONFERENCE

### Delegation Active at Utilities Commission Meet.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 15.—Hearing of public cases in the field where disputes first arise is being advocated by the Indiana delegation to the National Conference of Railroad and Utilities Commissioners. F. T. Singleton, of the State commission, expressed the Indiana viewpoint in an impromptu address late Wednesday. Singleton declared that his talk marked the first anniversary of Indiana's conference on railroad grade crossings, held in Indianapolis a year ago Wednesday.

Another Indiana man, E. I. Lewis, now of the Interstate Commerce Commission, delivered a report of the public relations committee. The report asserted that the best form of Government is that which implants ideals which lead to voluntary action without force.


