An Essay Contest Opens Today

All the school boys and girls of Indianapolis will be eligible to enter the Indianapolis Times Pony Express contest which commences today.
The contest will be based on the historical significance of the Pony Express which held forth in the early days of 1860.
The contest, which is being sponsored by The Times, is in connection with the Paramount picture, "The Pony Express," which starts at the Apollo on Sunday, Oct. 25.

There are but few rules which govern this contest, and on this account they must be followed out or else the compositions cannot be considered.

Pony Express riders were the only means of communication between the East and West in the early days, the country at that time was undergoing a titanic political upheaval due to the slavery issue and strenuous efforts were being made to swing California to the Southern cause and it was largely through the instrumentality of the Pony Express that the Golden State was saved to the Union Cause.

KLAN'S LIQUOR CASES DROPPED

Prosecutor Blames Adverse
Public Sentiment.

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Ind., Oct. 17.—State's cases against Claude Clements, Charles Edwards, Manuel Cable, Daniel Roche, Leo Scaggs, Leo Robin, John Osborne and Roy Combes, all arrested in a series of liquor raids led by the Horse Thief Detectives Association last May, have been dismissed by Prosecutor Arthur McLaughlin, it was learned today.

Prominent Society Leader Is

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 19.—While examination of the body of Mrs. Craig Biddle of Philadelphia, one of the Nation's foremost society leaders, gave evidence that death might have been due to alcoholism, police today investigated the theory that

Last June Mrs. Biddle separated from her millionaire husband and moved into the exclusive apartment here, which she occupied alone. Biddle visited her frequently, police are told.
Bruises discovered on the woman's neck were made by her own hands as she gasped for breath. County Autopsy Surgeon Wagner declared, and said alcoholism caused her death.
