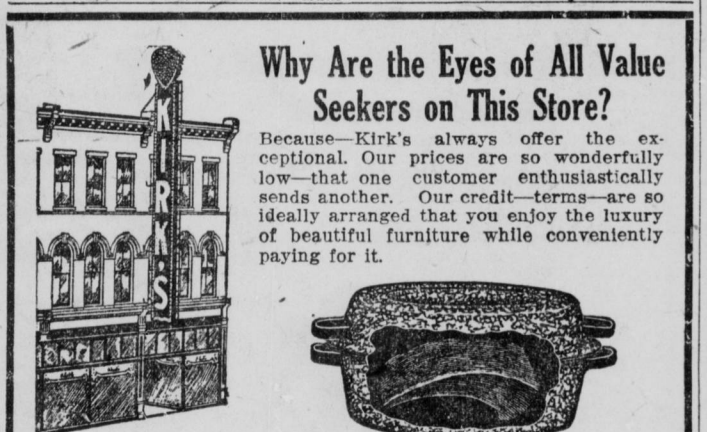

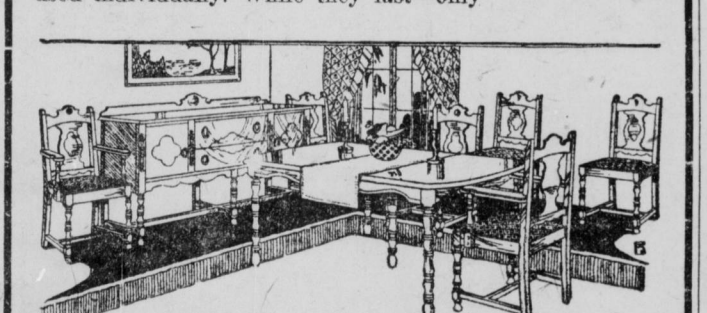

BOY PATRICIDE IS GIVEN LIFE

Sheik, Who Killed Preacher, Starts to Prison.

ALLISON, Iowa, Oct. 21.—With a smile on his face Warren Vander-vorst, 17, who shot and killed his father, Rev. R. J. Vandervoort, today started on his journey to the State penitentiary, where he is to serve the remainder of his life.

Behind him he left his mother, a middle-aged woman, dressed in black, her face a tragic mask of sorrow, unable to control the tears that gushed forth as the boy went off in the company of Sheriff W. S. Burma. By tonight the boy will be a number in the Ft. Madison (Iowa) prison.

Judge C. H. Kelly sentenced the youthful patricide, of the glossy-haired sheik type, to life.
