LONDON, Oct. 22.—While London still slept this morning, United States Senator Peter G. Gerry of Rhode Island, son of a wealthy American family, and Mrs. Edith Vanderbilt, went to St. George's district registry and were married at 8 a. m.

The bride is the widow of George W. Vanderbilt of the world-known Vanderbilts.

Only a dozen intimate friends and relatives witnessed the ceremony.

The nuptials completely surprised other friends of the couple, announcement of their engagement having been made only yesterday.

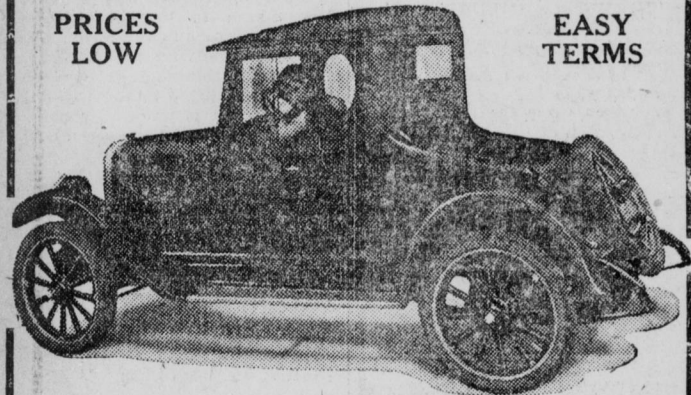
