FIVE HOLD UPS REPORTED; TAXI DRIVER VICTIM

Two Laundry Drivers Give
Up \$45 to Men Who Jump
From Roadster.

Five hold ups during the last
twelve hours, were being investi-
gated by police today.

Clifford Atkins, 1222 W. Thirty-

First St., taxi driver, said a colored
man who asked to be driven from
355 Indiana Ave., to 616 W. Ver-
mont St., early today drew a gun
when he arrived at the destination
and robbed him of \$38.75 and ran.
Lieutenant Dean and squad traced
the robber for several blocks by the
footprints in the snow.

George Cox, colored, Louisville,
Ky., said he asked two colored men
to direct him to the Y. M. C. A.,
Tuesday night. He paid their car
fare and when near Walnut and
Ronnock Sts., they drew a gun and
took \$15 from his suit case. Later
Cox identified Edward Jackson, col-
ored, 721 W. Twenty-Second St., as
one of the men. He was slated on a
vagrancy charge.

Orville McGee, 3955 Parke Ave.,
driver for the Progress Laundry,
told police he was headed for the
city late Tuesday, from Zionsville,
Ind., and when near Thirty-Eighth
St. and Kessler Blvd., two men in a
roadster drove along side, ordered
him to stop and get out. One drew
a gun and the other took \$45 and
his watch and then threw his auto
keys away.

The same two men are thought
to have held up Miller Greer, 1744
N. Delaware St., on Salt Lake Rd.
nine miles from the city. They took
his watch and a sum of money, leav-
ing him stranded.

Michael Seal, 42, of 1729 S. Union
St., an insurance collector, was
charged with robbery and petit lar-
ceny. Police said he is alleged to
have taken a purse and \$14.50 from
Barney McBane, 68, of 809 Fayette
St., near Maryland and West Sts.
Persons who say they saw Seal
knock McBane down caught him
and held him until police arrived.

WRECK TOLL IS NINETEEN LIVES

Three More Die in Memphis
Hospitals.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 28.—The
death toll in the wreck of the
Frisco line Florida-Kansas City flir,
"Sunnyland" mounted to nineteen to-
day, as three more victims died in
Memphis hospital.

P. J. Sandy of Army, Miss., a
brakeman, and Yongue Jordan, 12,
and Arthur Jordan, 10, of Carrollton,
Ga., were added to the victims of
the "Sunnyland," which went down a
30-foot embankment at Victoria,
Miss., early Tuesday.

A dozen of those injured were still
in a serious condition in hospitals
here. Several are expected to die.
About fifty others were less serious-
ly injured.
