'MOTHERS' GET SETBACK

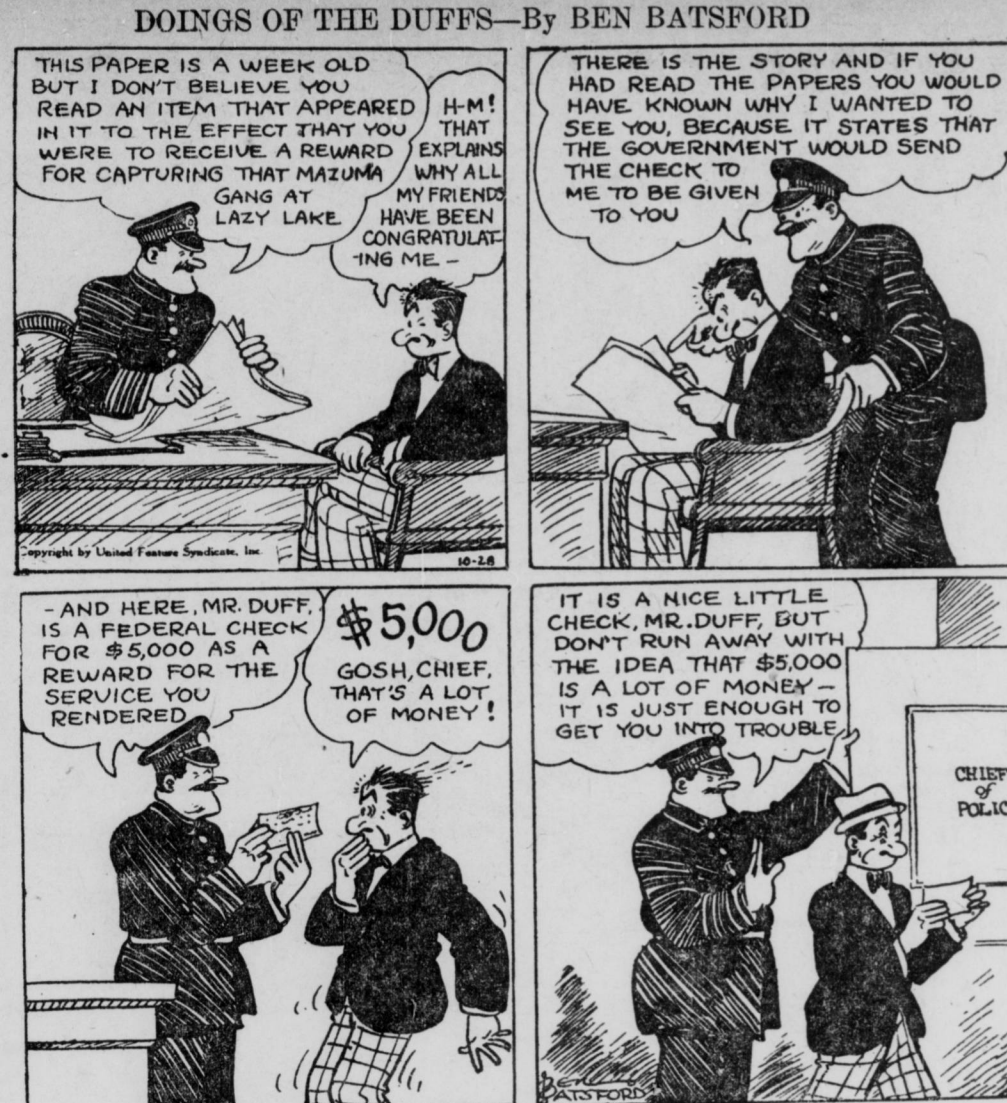

The chaperones were to go into the fraternity houses the first of the next semester.

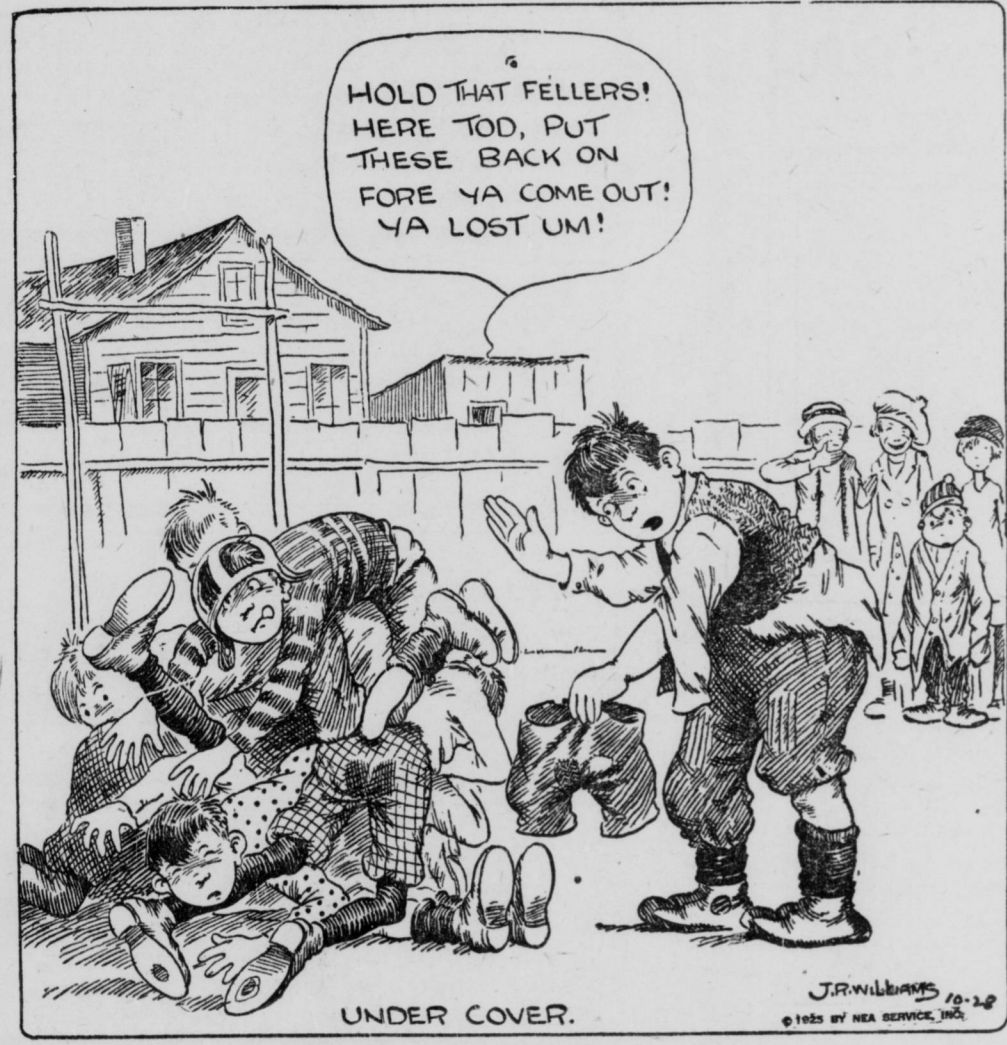
