

TO MAKE LAST DAWES PLANS

Committee to Complete Final Arrangements.

Final arrangements for the reception of Vice President Charles G. Dawes, who will speak on Senate rules revisions at Cattle Taborade under auspices of the Chamber of Commerce on the evening of Nov. 15, will be made by the chamber's committee on arrangements at noon Friday, it was announced today. Completion of details awaits word from the Vice President as to the exact hour of his arrival.

The Vice President will be accompanied by Mrs. Dawes, Senator and Mrs. Charles S. Deneen and Mrs. Medill McCormick.

Arrangements are being effected with Police Chief Herman F. Rikhoff for a police escort. The Merchants Heat and Light Company will broadcast General Dawes' speech through WFDM.

Dawes was to have appeared here Oct. 17, but his speaking engagement was canceled following the death of Senator Samuel M. Ralston.

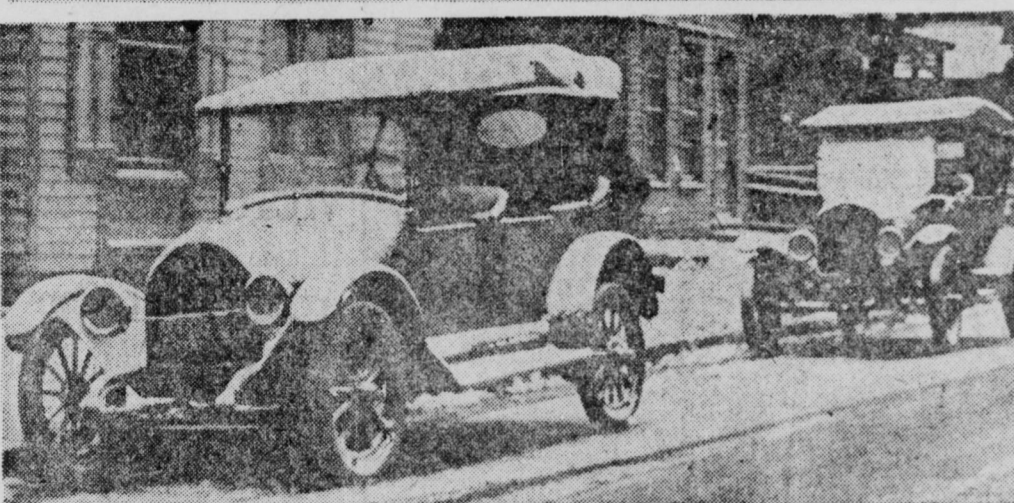
HOOK HEADS SCOUTS

Don'ts Issued Halloween Prankers

Police Inspector Warns Funmakers Against Maliciousness.

Police Inspector John S. White today listed "don'ts" for Halloween prankers.

DON'T soap windows of autos. DON'T soap street car tracks. DON'T damage property, such as overturning flower boxes, sheds, ash cans and carrying away gates and porch swings.

DON'T use firearms with blank cartridges as they might be loaded with real bullets.

DON'T throw talcum powder during the downtown celebration.

DON'T masquerade as a bootlegger and carry liquor on your person.

Inspector White said pranks are innocent looking in their creation but later become serious. Soaping of auto windows and windshields obstructs the vision of the driver, White said. Slick street car tracks from soaping the rails might result in fatal accidents.

Damaging of property will result in arrest on charges of malicious destruction of property, he said. Use of firearms might cause serious injury or death to the victim of a joke. White said he would instruct his men to watch closely the flow of liquor and not to hesitate in making arrests.

So if you want to keep out of trouble and stay out of jail the "don'ts" should govern your activities during Halloween.

FOUR TAKEN IN MORNING RUNS

Arrests Follow Alleged Hijacking Fight.
