

NATURE TAKES CARE OF FISH

Lazy Member of Perch Family Still Lives.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Nature has a way of looking out for herself. For instance, the flatfish, an offshoot of the perch group, has an eye on each side of its head when first hatched, and it swims vertically like a fish is supposed to swim. But at an early age one eye migrates around to the other side of the head, and the lazy fish sinks to the bottom, and henceforth lives with the eye-side up.
C. Tate Ragon, eminent English zoologist, explains:
"Being an offshoot of the perch, the fish inherited the lazy habit of lying on one side," he says. "And if such a fish found it profitable to lie in wait for its prey in this position, it would naturally try to make

use of the eye of the underside, pressing it upward against the edge of the frontal bone."
Tate then explained that after many years of this effort on the part of the fish, nature has stepped in and now does the trick without "bothering to ask the fish if he wants that way or not."
BAY TAKES HIS LIFE
Sailor Who Survived Seas Fifty Years Is Drowned.
