

## EVACUATION OF BULGARIA ENDS

Greeks Complete Retirement.

ATHENS, Oct. 30.—Bulgarians along the Macedonian frontier, pushed back by the Greek invasion over the border, started today to re-occupy their abandoned territory under supervision of French, British and Italian military attaches.

It has been agreed that the Bulgarians should only return to their frontier posts when the Greek evacuation was complete and the Greeks were safely encamped in their old places on the Greek side.

With this re-occupation the original status was restored and the border incident was deemed definitely closed from a military standpoint.
