Classes to Be Held Two Nights Each Week—Start Thursday.

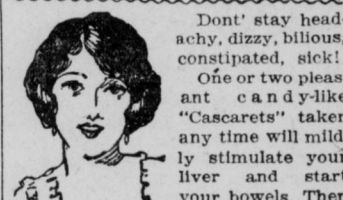

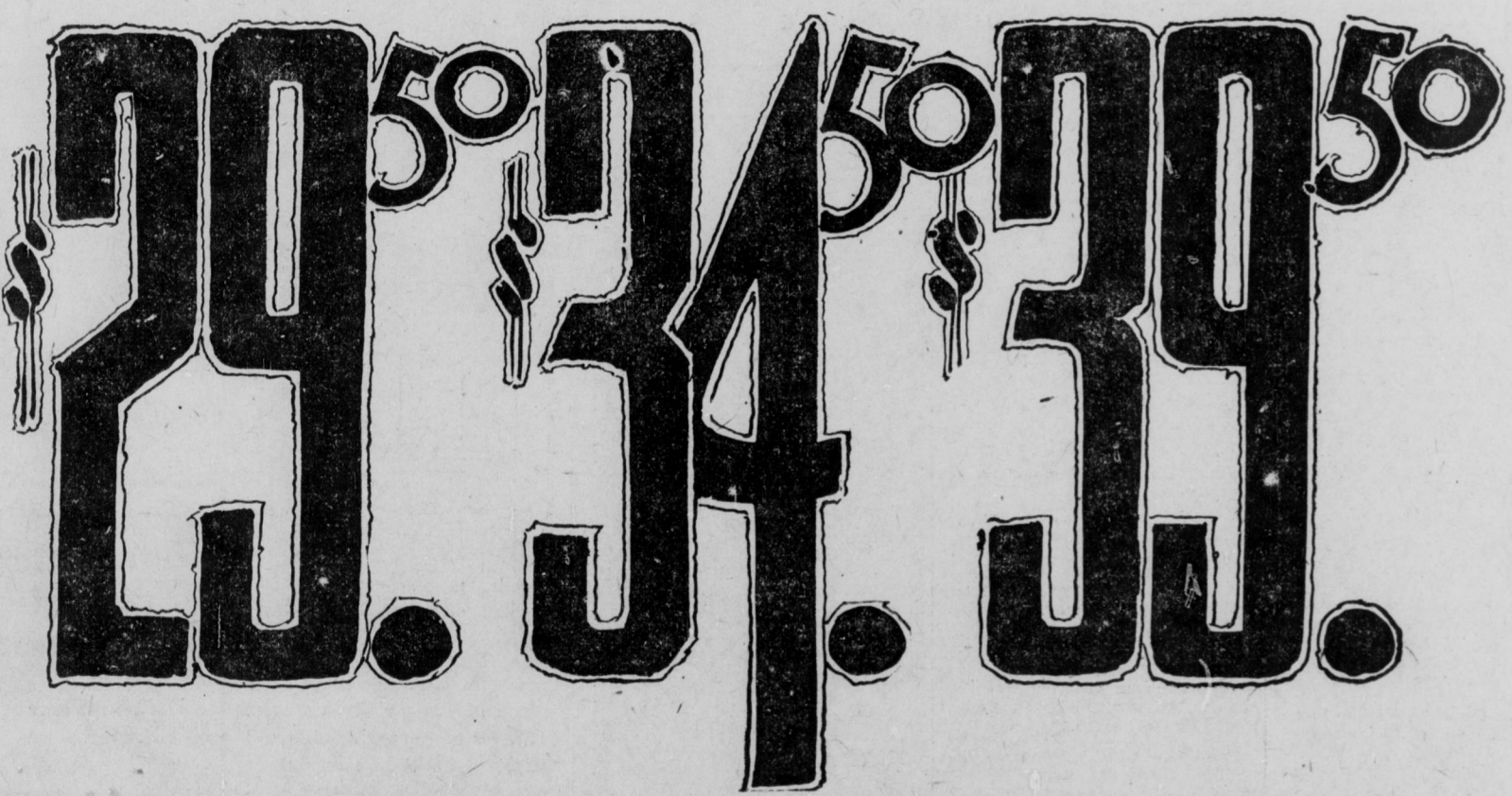
