Salesmen Must Explain.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 3.—Charged with violation of a decree regulating competition, ninety-two salesmen of the National Cash Register Company, were under contempt of court order today to appear in Federal Court here Dec. 15.

The order was issued at the request of John L. Lott, special investigator of the Department of Justice, who has been investigating the sales policy of the cash register concern.

Lott charged specifically that the salesmen used unfair competitive methods.

Spectators at Trial Watch Silently

Trio in Noblesville Trial
Not Popular With
Townsfolk.

CIRCUIT COURT ROOM, NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Nov. 3.—Gray-haired farmers and their wives—honest folk—scores of them, sit with grim faces in this brown-walled court room, where bit by bit the State is presenting evidence which may send D. C. Stephenson, Earl Klinck and Earl Gentry to the electric chair.

Silently they study the faces of the prisoners. Stephenson, Klinck and Gentry, charged with the murder of Miss Madge Oberholtzer.

Every inch of space is taken. The walls are lined and spectators choke the aisles.

Mother's Sobs Heard

A mother's broken-hearted sobs were heard in this courtroom two days ago, and their echo is still here. A father's manly attempt to relate unmoved, what his daughter had told him, when dying, faltered. "Oh daddy, it was so long—that ride from Hammond" was heard.

Klinck was the best poker face, Stephenson, casually observed, seems nonchalant, but tell-tale signs are showing through. There are nervous little twitches at the corners of his eyes and he can't control those plump, smooth hands of his. Idle they may be, but a censorious intimation from the State, and those fingers fly to a pencil and he writes rapidly, anxiously.

And Gentry! At odd moments he searches the many unfriendly eyes out there before him.

Attitude Plain

There is small chance to mistake the attitude of the people. In the courtroom, in the streets of Noblesville, one hears nothing in defense of the prisoners. "They're good lawyers—they may fight free, but we hope the State will win," is the usual comment.

Mrs. Oberholtzer expects to attend all the trial. "If I can stand it," she adds. "I could just hear Madge's voice when I testified. I'm afraid I didn't make a very good witness. I wanted to be so brave and strong, but they confused me with their objections. Telling about it, brought everything back so. I'm sorry I cried," she added sadly.

Ira Holmes, defense attorney has received many threatening letters, he says.

"It should be remembered," he says, "that this case is parallel to many suicide cases. Take the case of a girl who has been promised marriage. If the young man deserts her at the altar and she kills herself—regardless of prepared wedding clothes and other things, isn't the act suicide on the girl's part? Certainly."



Cornerstone Laid for Amalgamated Auditorium

Cornerstone laying ceremonies for the new Amalgamated Auditorium being erected by the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, at Capitol Ave. and Pratt St., have been held. B. Foster is business agent of the local and president of the Amalgamated Auditorium Company.

An auditorium, stage and ballroom, smoking room and women's rest room, club rooms, offices and two shop rooms, are included in the fireproof structure.

The building is a dark full range of color of Chinchilla brick

trimmed with Indiana Limestone entrances and pediments, the second floor being treated by a series of arches and a bay detailed in steel casement sash and copper.

The main doors are of heavy oak spiked with a wrought iron grille of the type similar to those used in the Toma Palazzo, Venice, the style being carried out in Italian Renaissance. The interior of the ballroom with a fifty foot vaulted ceiling is flanked on one

side by a balcony treated with an arcade and walnut pilasters and cornice.
