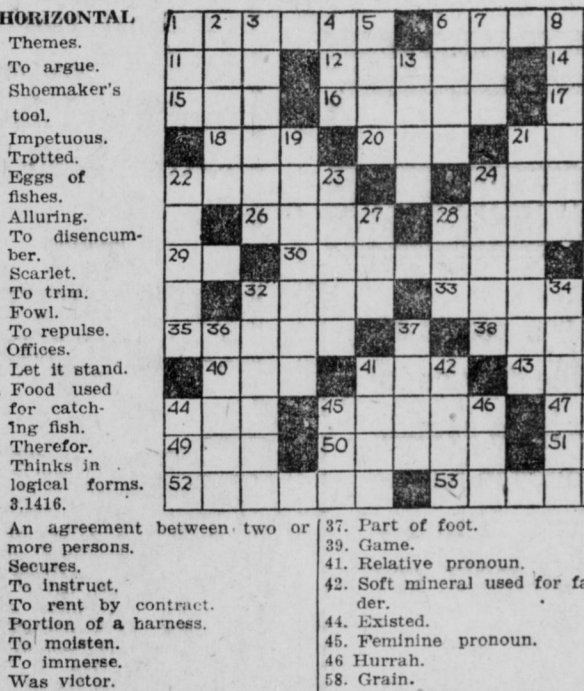

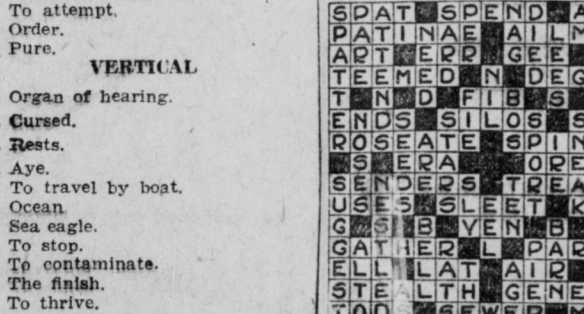


Today's Cross-Word Puzzle

WET FESTIVAL SCARES TOWN

Italian Shopkeepers Fear Blackshirt Riot.

BROSIO, Italy, Nov. 6.—A wedding procession headed by two dromedaries, flanked by negroes in evening dress, and crowned by an angel with silver wings, set a new standard for nuptial display, as it wound through the streets of this town, to the excitement of a crowd, which mistook it for a Fascist punitive expedition.

The occasion was the marriage of two mountebanks from a neighboring fair, for which all the performers of the circus had been mobilized. After numerous rounds of champagne, in which every one but the dromedaries participated, the cortege joined the traffic amid a great tooting of horns and rattling of tin snare drums. In the crowd which immediately assembled a panicky impulse broke out. Apprehensive shopkeepers, fearing a Blackshirt invasion, began to lock their shutters. Others, seeing an angel and what seemed to be a train of mourners, assumed that it was a funeral and began to remove their hats.

Fortunately the dromedaries, demurely nodding with deacon-like placidity, dispelled this ominous error before it could give offense; but their passage was followed by an excited search for the reason of the parade, which was generally assumed to be the arrival of a new cargo of freaks or strange animals freshly broken to captivity.

When these were identified as a young man and his bride, no disappointment was felt. Amid a respectful silence, the procession toured the city to the sound of its own jubilation.
