

G. O. P. CLAIMS MORAL VICTORY

took four of the seven council seats.

The Democratic stronghold of Ft. Wayne, went to the Republicans when William C. Geake, was elected over Mayor William J. Hosey by 3,000.

The battles waged between Klan and anti-Klan factions resulted in a deadlock, the Klansmen capturing just about as many city offices as the anti-faction.

Montgomery's election in South Bend was a clean-cut victory for the anti-Klan adherents.

Evansville remained safe in the Republican column when Herbert Maile won over J. K. Jennings by a majority, 5,952. This was conceded to be a Klan victory.

At Terre Haute

The most sweeping victory in the history of the city was scored by the Republicans at Terre Haute, where Mayor Ora G. Davis was re-elected by a majority of more than seven times as great as that by which he was elected four years ago.

In one of the closest races in the history of the city John Hampton, Republican, was victor over R. Milton Retherford at Muncie by a margin of 400 votes.

Anderson also remained in the Republican column when Dr. I. W. Williams was elected by a substantial majority.

The eighteen-year regime of Mayor Durgan at Lafayette was overthrown when Dr. Albert H. Ross was elected by nearly 1,000 votes.

The Republicans lost Logansport when Frank V. Guthrie was elected mayor in the heaviest vote ever cast in the city.

Frankfort is believed to have gone into the Republican camp on the strength of last minute returns showing Maurice Petty, Republican, elected by about thirty-six votes. Petty had Klan support against Mayor Keen, Democrat.

John Line, La Porte's new mayor, is the second Republican in twenty-four years.

Klan at Kokomo

Silk Spurgeon, Republican and Klan candidate, was elected mayor of Kokomo in a tight vote. Martin, a Socialist, polled 1,113 votes.
