

ADAMS COUNTY WINNER IN TON LITTER CLASSIC

Twelve Produced in Year—
Livestock Official Gives
Figures.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Nov. 5.—To Adams County goes the county honors in the Hoosier Ton Litter Club classic for 1925, according to James R. Wiley, assistant secretary of the Indiana Livestock Breeders' Association, which cooperates with the Purdue University agricultural extension department in conducting the club.

Twelve ton litters were produced in Adams County this year, which is five more than was produced by Wells County members a year ago, the previous high mark for a county. Wells County advanced its own record of last year by producing nine ton litters this year.

The twelve-ton litters in the county weighed 29,087 pounds, an average of 2,424 pounds to the litter at the age of 180 days. Pigs in the litters averaged over 238 pounds.

Win County Honors

County honors in Adams go to Henry Blahey and his son John, on a litter of eleven purebred Durocs that weighed 3,070 pounds at 180 days of age. This litter is also second heaviest in the State, first place going to Jenkins Bros. of Orleans on a cross-bred Duroc-Yorkshire litter of fifteen pigs that weighed 4,080 pounds.

Erwin Fuelling north of Decatur, produced the two next heaviest litters, in the county. There were ten pigs in each litter and they weighed 2,865 and 2,590 pounds respectively. He also produced a third litter of pigs that weighed 2,118 pounds. All three litters were purebred Chester Whites.

Others Place

Fourth place in Adams County went to E. W. Busche on eleven purebred Durocs that weighed 2,887; fifth to Marcelo Davison, eleven purebred Poland Chinas, 2,571; sixth to L. F. Sprunger, eleven purebred Durocs, 2,465; seventh to Fred M. Bielecki, ten grain Durocs, 2,387; eighth to C. W. R. Schwartz, eight purebred Poland Chinas, 2,331; ninth to L. Reuben Schwartz, ten purebred Durocs, 2,153; tenth to Ed. S. Christen, eleven purebred Berkshires, 2,136; eleventh to G. R. Bielecki, ten purebred Durocs, 2,012 pounds.

"Our ton litter work this year shows the value of purebred hogs in producing market pork," said County Agent L. M. Busche in com-

menting about the Adams County Ton Litter Club.

There are several hundred pieces in this collection. It is believed to be one of the largest collections of cello music in any library of this size.



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
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
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
