## GEORGE HAY TO WSM

"Solemn Old Judge" to Join Nashville Station's Staff.  
Station WSM, Nashville, Tenn., announces that it has obtained the services of George Dewey Hay, popularly known to thousands as the "Solemn Old Judge." Mr. Hay will begin his new duties at WSM at once.

George Hay first came into the limelight during his reign as head of station WMC, Memphis, Tenn. Then one day he was invited to Chicago, and while there he and his famous steamboat whistle made such favorable impression that he was persuaded to sign up with WLS. In 1924 he won the gold cup awarded by a national radio magazine in a contest for the country's most popular radio announcer, and in the 1925 contest he again stood near the top. The "Solemn Old Judge" has originated his own particular style of announcing, refusing to conform to stereotyped ideas, and is capable of handling any type of program.

**DELINQUENT** taxes in Lake County are expected to reach nearly \$250,000 this year, it was reported. Taxpayers of Gary this year have paid taxes totaling \$51,839.79 on real estate and personal property.

Nancy Bruno was sentenced to ten days in the Lake County jail at Crown Point on charge of selling liquor. She is a mother of seven small children.

The largest class in the history of the Connersville Aerle of Eagles will be celebrated when 154 new members join Armistice day. The total membership will be 1,500.

A new record was set by South Bend city schools with the average daily attendance since the beginning of the school year reported at 96.6.
