

NEW MEXICAN LAW IS AIMED AT FOREIGNERS

Commercial Circles Alarmed
at Attempt to Hold
Property.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 9.—Commercial circles in this city have been somewhat alarmed by the origin of a legislative project to regulate article twenty-seven, which pertains to the holding of real property in Mexico, so as to make it apply to stock companies and corporations as well as to individuals.

Article twenty-seven states that "only Mexicans by birth or naturalization can acquire dominion over lands, waters, etc. or obtain concessions to exploit mines, waters, or combustibles within the republic; the State may concede the same right to aliens provided that they agree before the Ministry of Foreign Relations to consider themselves nationals in respect to their holdings, and not to invoke the protection of any foreign government under penalty of losing their properties to the government."

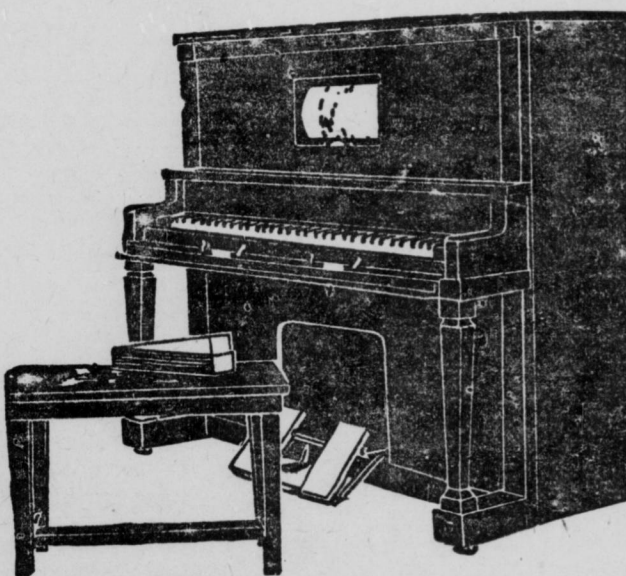
