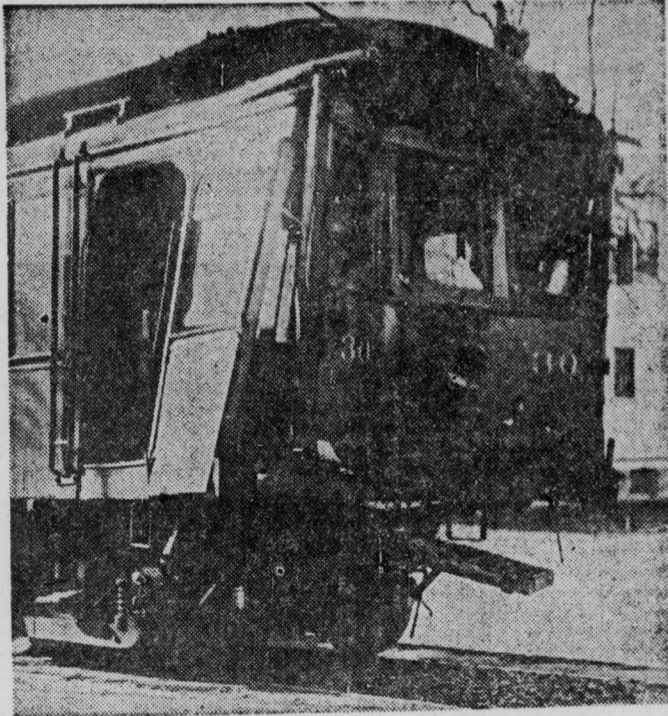
BOARD MAKES CHANGES

EUGENE STREET SUIT VENUED

Case Taken to Danville Circuit Court.

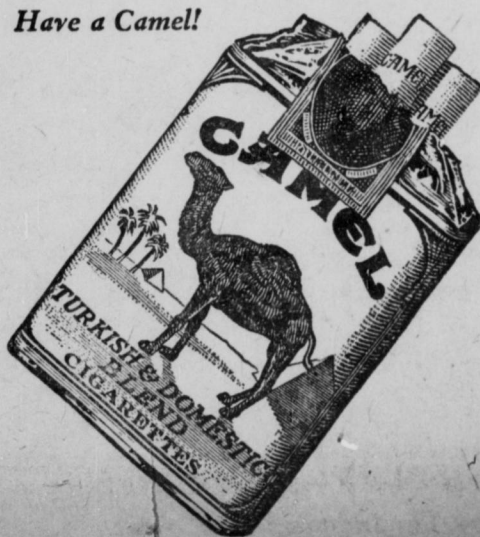

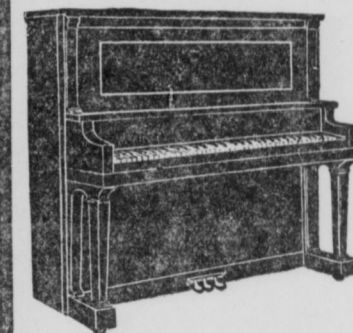
