CHILD WELFARE WORK IS ALDED

State Uses Full Federal Apportionment.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Indiana
will this year for the first time use
her full apportionment of Federal
aid for maternity and welfare work.
The state will have used \$25,750 of
Federal money by end of the year
in nursing, instructing and helping
mothers both before and after birth
of their children.

In 1924 there was \$28,763 available
in Federal aid, but Indiana used
only \$26,500. With an equal amount
available in 1923, only \$24,955 was
used.
To obtain the full Federal aid the
state must appropriate funds for the
welfare work to an amount com-
parative with the Federal apportion-
ment.

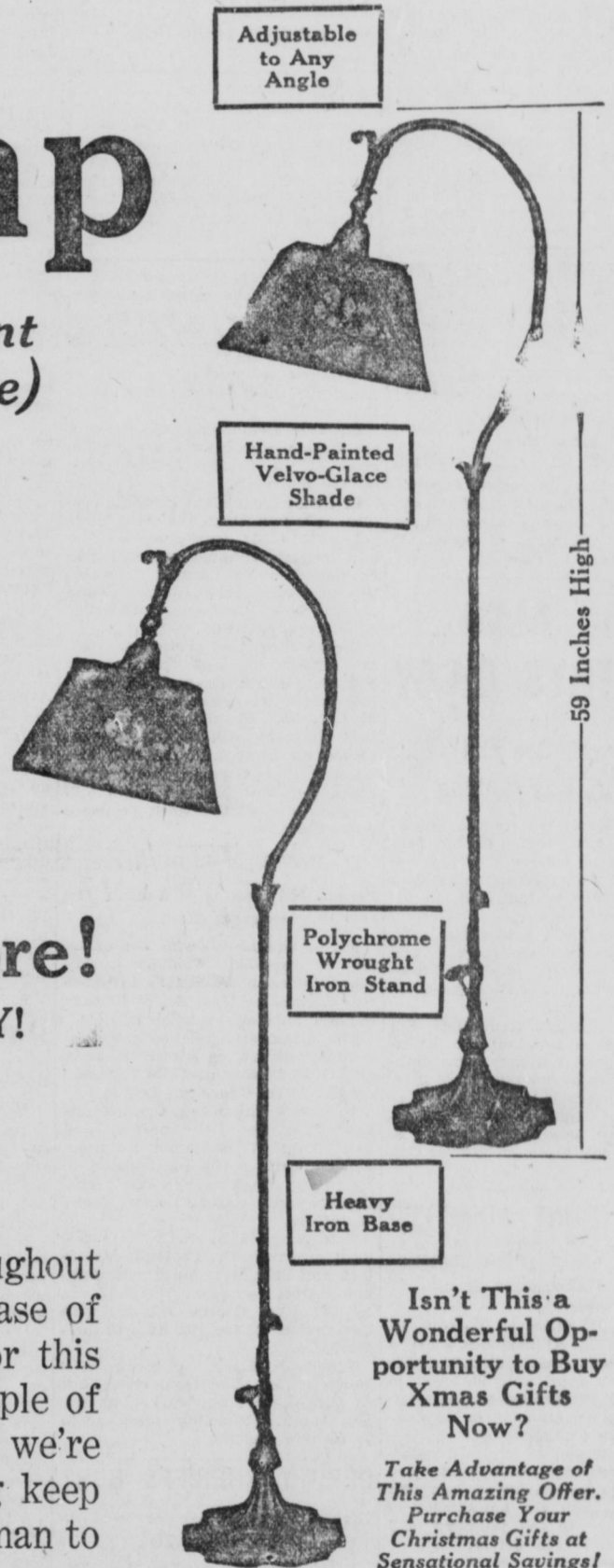
