CHILD WELFARE WORK IS ALDED

State Uses Full Federal Apportionment.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Indiana will this year for the first time use her full apportionment of Federal aid for maternity and welfare work.

The state will have used \$25,750 of Federal money by end of the year in nursing, instructing and helping mothers both before and after birth of their children.

In 1924 there was \$28,763 available in Federal aid, but Indiana used only \$26,500. With an equal amount available in 1923, only \$24,995 was used.

To obtain the full Federal aid the state must appropriate funds for the welfare work to an amount comparative with the Federal apportionment.

Potato prices at city market today were steady after the recent advances and sold from 5 and 7 pounds for 25 cents to 7 pounds for 50 cents. Alligator pears sold at 70 cents each. Creamery butter was lower at 57 cents a pound and fresh country butter unchanged at 55 cents a pound.

Other prices included: Cranberries, 20 cents a pound; California tomatoes, 25 cents a pound; California seedless grapes, 20 cents a pound; Tokay grapes, 2 pounds for 15 cents, and lime beans, 60 cents a pound.

New Florida cocoanuts sold for 10 cents each. Green beans and wax beans were 20 cents a pound; Jonathan and Grimes Golden apples, 2½ pounds for 25 cents and Florida grapefruit, 10 cents each and 2 for 15 cents.
