Former Official Says Gov-  
ernment Advocated  
Here Is Good.

"The city manager form of gov-  
ernment is by far the most efficient  
form under which a city can op-  
erate," according to T. C. Mullen,  
former city attorney of Michigan  
City, Ind.

Michigan City was the first In-  
diana city to adopt the managerial  
plan after the statute permitting its  
selection was passed. Mullen was  
city attorney four years ago when  
the business plan was accepted. He  
served until 1924.

"Necessary and needed improve-  
ments advocated there for fifteen  
or twenty years all were accom-  
plished in a short time," with the
