

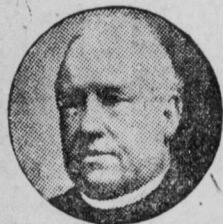
SCOTTISH RITE

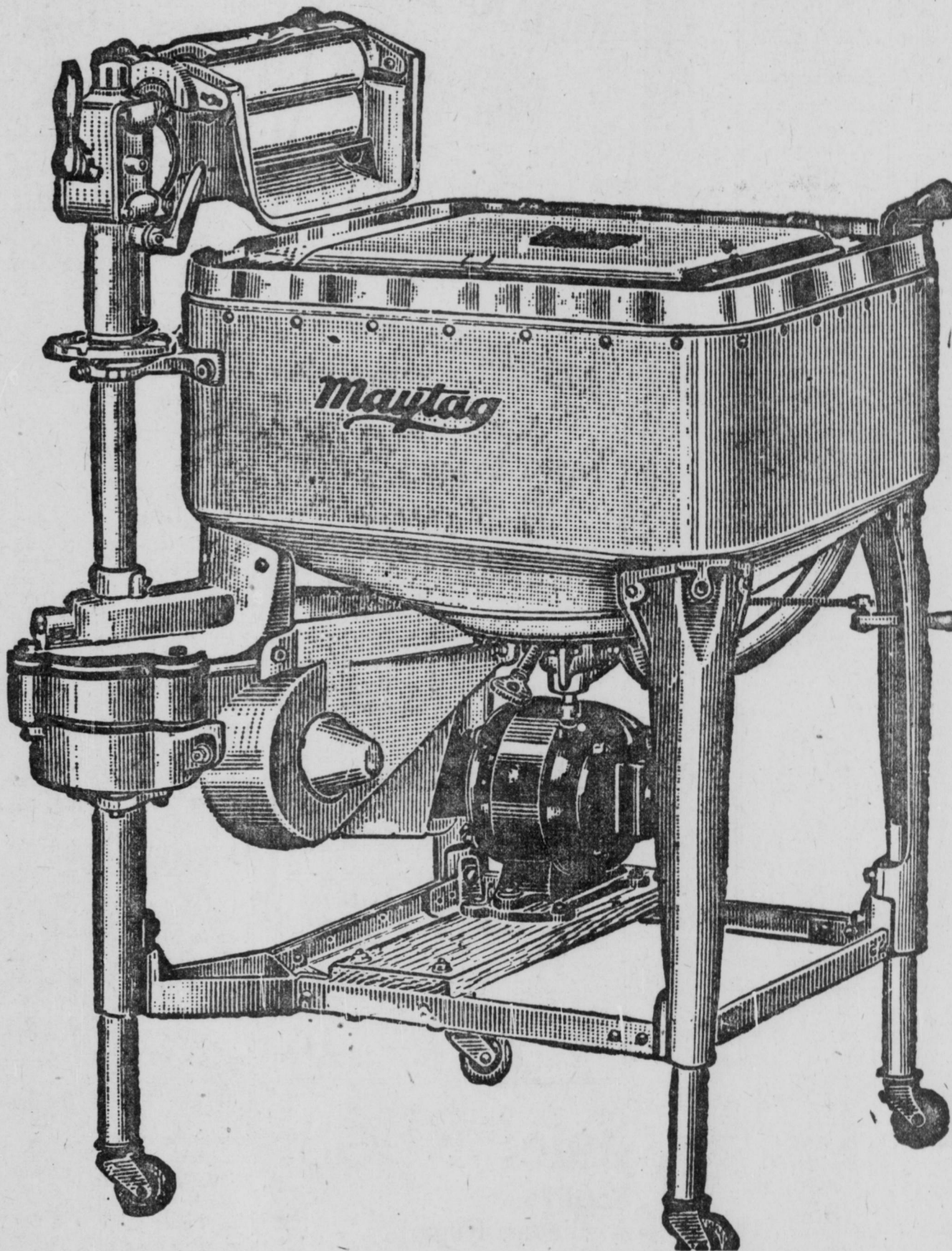
