

THREE GROCERY BANDITS SOUGHT

Trio Get \$1,000 in Hold-up of Collector.

Detectives today were searching for the bandit trio who obtained about \$1,000 in a hold-up of a Standard grocery and a collector late Monday.

According to Lieutenant Klalber two of the bandits left their auto, driven by a third man, and entered the store. One of the bandits robbed M. A. Wilson, 1933 Central Ave., manager, of \$25 and took \$30 from the cash register. The first bandit then called his companion, standing guard near the door, and the two bound Wilson and placed him in a rear room and awaited the arrival of Howard Jackson, 2258 N. Illinois St., collector, and son of L. A. Jackson, Standard Grocers' president.

When Jackson appeared one of the bandits held a gun on him while the other took the receipts he had collected from sixteen other stores and Jackson's revolver. The robbers escaped in their auto.

Standard Grocery Company has been the victim of three hold-ups, in which the loot totaled over \$2,000, in the last two years police said.

NOEL FOUND GUILTY

Slayer of Two Faces Death in Electric Chair.

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 17.—Though six alienists testified he was "crazy as a loon" Harrison W. Noel Monday night was found guilty of murder in the first degree, for which the automatic penalty is death in the electric chair. Noel, 20, "intellectual" son of a New York lawyer and a former college student, was convicted of killing Raymond Pierce, a negro taxi driver. He further is charged with killing Mary Daly, 6, after he kidnapped her.

According to the complaint, they were married Oct. 20, 1919, and separated March 22, 1925. Mrs. Moore asked \$3,000 alimony and \$100 a month for support and custody of their daughter.

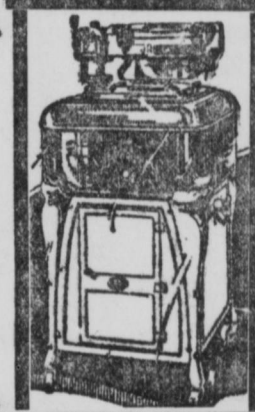
