THIRTY OTHERS TO BE INDICTED

'Higher-Ups' in \$9,000,000 Beer Plot Are Named.

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Thirty new Federal indictments are expected before the end of the week in connection with the alleged \$9,000,000 a year beer conspiracy. They are in addition to the indictments of the Boston & Maine Railroad, the Gilt Edge Brewery Company of Boston and twenty-six railroad employees, dry agents, Chicago policemen and truck drivers.

"Higher ups" will be named, it was hinted. Between 3,000 and 4,000 railroad carloads of beer have been shipped from the Gilt Edge brewery to Chicago since the first of this year, Federal agents said, involving men all along the way.

The grand jury still is in session. David Allen, manager of the brewery, is on his way to Europe, officials here have been informed.
