

DEMOCRATS DO NOT RECOGNIZE JUDGE CHARLEY

Alleged Naming of Orbison on Park Board Draws Protest.

The Democratic party does not consider alleged appointment of "Judge" Charles J. Orbison as Democratic member of the park board as legal recognition of the law requiring at least one party member on that body, Frank P. Baker, election board member, said today.

"Orbison is not a Democrat," Baker said. "Therefore, John L. Duvall, our fugitive mayor-elect, is not recognizing the Democratic party."

Baker classified the Duvall maneuver as in line with Mayor Shank's appointment of the late Mrs. Sarah Shank as Democratic member of the park board.

Pressure Exerted

Considerable pressure has been exerted upon Charles A. Bookwalter, president, and other park board members to refuse to resign, it became known today. Among those who urged Bookwalter to remain was Charles E. Coffin, board of works president.

Bookwalter said he had not determined whether he would resign to make way for the new park board Duvall is said to have announced.

"But I'm rather inclined to leave a place where they don't want me," he said.

Orbison 'Regenerated'

Orbison recently told Klansmen he had been "morally regenerated" through support of Duvall, a Republican.

Democratic politicians today were murmuring concerning the reports that two strong Coffin adherents will preside over the two city criminal courts. Governor Jackson appointed four city judges Wednesday.

Victim of Fall Pursued By Fate

Last Thanksgiving, his son Louis was killed in an auto accident near Greenwood.

Funeral arrangements have not been made. Beside the widow, Terhune was survived by two sons and two daughters.

Mayor Shank announced today he would not repeat his potato market for the poor, because he had investigated and discovered the present high prices are due to shortage of the crop.

"When I was in South Bend I found the farmers were getting \$2 a bushel, while they're selling for only \$2.50 wholesale here," Shank said. "Therefore, it seems there's no excessive profit for the middleman as there was the first time I ran a potato market."
