

DEMOCRATS DO NOT RECOGNIZE JUDGE CHARLEY

Alleged Naming of Orbison on Park Board Draws Protest.

The Democratic party does not consider alleged appointment of "Judge" Charles J. Orbison as Democratic member of the park board as legal recognition of the law requiring at least one party member on that body, Frank P. Baker, election board member, said today.

"Orbison is not a Democrat," Baker said. "Therefore, John L. Duval, our fugitive mayor-elect, is not recognizing the Democratic party."

Baker classified the Duval maneuver as in line with Mayor Shank's appointment of the late Mrs. Sarah Shank as Democratic member of the park board.

Pressure Exerted

Considerable pressure has been exerted upon Charles A. Bookwalter, president, and other park board members to refuse to resign, it became known today. Among those who urged Bookwalter to remain was Charles E. Coffin, board of works president.

Bookwalter said he had not determined whether he would resign to make way for the new park board Duval is said to have announced. "But I'm rather inclined to leave a place where they don't want me," he said.

Orbison "Regenerated"

Orbison recently told Klansmen he had been "morally regenerated" through support of Duval, a Republican.

Democratic politicians today were murmuring concerning the reports that two strong Coffin adherents will preside over the two city criminal courts. Governor Jackson appointed four city judges Wednesday.

Last Thanksgiving, his son Louis was killed in an auto accident near Greenfield.

Funeral arrangements have not been made. Beside the widow, Terhune is survived by two sons and two daughters.

UNIFORMS FOR ARRESTS, ORDER TO POLICEMEN

Hoosier State Auto Body Directors Make Protests.

State and city police today were ordered to wear full uniform when making arrests, as result of a protest by the Hoosier State Auto Association.

Directors of the association meeting at the English Wednesday, condemned the practice of officers arresting motorists while not in uniform. E. W. Steinhart, association president, was voted the power of appointing a committee to study the situation and to devise a plan to stop the practice.

Chief in Accord

State Police Chief Robert Humes said today that he was in hearty accord with the stand.

"All members of my force will be in full uniform, with insignia and grubs showing, when they arrest motorists on the highways. The only time my men work in civilian clothes is when they are on detective work assignments," he said.

Rikhoff Agrees

City Police Chief Herman Rikhoff said he always has maintained officers should be in uniform and the city officers on motorcycles have been in uniform, except the hat, for several months.

Steinhart said repeated reports from motorists made the association feel the time is ripe for a drive on constables, deputy sheriffs and other law enforcement agencies who work the roads in clothing that does not make them stand out in appearance from a hold-up man, a hijacker or a person who makes his living by falsely arresting motorists without power.
