

NEW SCHOOL MEMBERS TO GIVE POLICIES

Definite Plans Expected to
Be Announced
Soon.

Definite policies of the new Indianapolis school board members will be announced soon, it was understood today. The new members, Charles W. Kern, Mrs. Lillian Sedwick and Theodore Vonnegut, will take effect Jan. 1.

They have not met yet, they said, but expect to do so in a short time. The three members-elect will attend the school board meeting tonight.

Second Meeting

This is the second meeting they have attended, to become acquainted with the routine and procedure of school board business.

It is rumored that Miss Georgia Alexander, a school principal here for years, may be made superintendent in the place of E. U. Graff after Jan. 1. She denied the rumor today.

Other Changes

It is expected that changes will be made throughout the public school system.

The members, immediately following election, said they were in favor of any progressive action being carried out by the present board. They are in favor of the school board's building program and have promised cooperation.

STANDARD TO BUILD PLANTS

Oil Storage Centers Will Be
Elected.

The Standard Oil Company of Indiana today announced plans for two oil and gasoline storage and distributing plants of approximately 900,000 gallons capacity, one to be located at S. Harding St. and the Big Four Railroad and the other at South Keystone Ave. and the Big Four.

Both will cost \$300,000. The South Harding St. project will hold 240,000 gallons of refined oil and gasoline, and 150,000 gallons of lubricating oil.

Fifteen storage tanks will hold 340,000 gallons of refined oils and gasoline at the Keystone Ave. plant, in addition to a 60,000 gallons storage room for lubricating oils.

AMENDS MADE TO OLD COUPLE

Money and Deed Given by
Real Estate Brokers.

Restitution to an aged couple, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Kahn, amounting to \$2,061 and a clear deed to a forty-acre farm in Martin County, was given today by Clarence Kirschner, Solon Freeman and William Sheldon, Terre Haute real estate brokers. The men were sentenced to serve nine months in jail and fined \$300 each by Federal Judge Robert C. Bazzell Monday for using the mails to defraud the old couple of their farm.

Each of the men, as they appeared in court, deeply regretted the incident and said they did not realize the condition of the farm they traded the old couple for their Montana homestead.

The Kahnne made the trip from Montana to Martin County in a covered wagon. They found the brokers had misrepresented the condition of the property and that there was no house, barn or granary on the farm, as they were told. They found the farm not tillable and the roads inaccessible.
