

POSTOFFICES ARE ASSAILED, IN MAGAZINE

Civil Service Leader Says
Reputed 'Efficiency'
Doesn't Exist.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Contention of Postmaster General Harry S. New that the United States Post Office Department is operated efficiently, is controverted by William Dudley Foulke, former president of the National Civil Service Reform League.

New recently asserted that despite the \$42,000,000 postal deficit, "the department is managed with a scrupulous exactness and regard for safe economics that is not equalled in any great industrial corporation in the country."

Foulke, writing in the magazine, Good Government, declares, however, that the deficit could be largely eliminated if the department were operated as a business institution, rather than a political machine. Foulke points out that 40,000 fourth-class postmasters in the country mainly owe their appointments to politics, and asserts, "It is safe to say that a large proportion of the postmasters of the country could be released from their positions and their salaries saved and the work of the offices would go on just as well without them."

PRODUCTION INCREASES

From July to September of this year the State's power output jumped from 115,668,000 to 129,971,000 kilowatt-hours.


