

JULIETTA MAY BECOME HOME FOR CHILDREN

Cassius Hogle Gives Plan
for Use of County
Asylum.

A dream of Cassius L. Hogle who succeeds John Kitley as member of the Marion County board of commissioners Jan. 1 to convert Julietta, County Insane Asylum, into a children's home may become a reality soon, Hogle said today. After Jan. 1 the commissioners plan to close Julietta by removing the present patients either to their homes or to State institutions.

The county council has refused funds for keeping insane persons, saying it is the State's duty.

According to Harry Dunn, county auditor, the council at its last session appropriated \$50,000 for the support of orphans. This money can be used to operate Julietta, as a children's institution, Dunn said. He also said it would cost no more to provide for children than for insane patients.

Hogle said he has the assurance of Charles O. Sutton for support in establishing the home, but has not discussed the matter with John McCloskey, president of the commissioners. Hogle, who is now president of the county council, said members of that body also assured him of support.

At present children made wards of the county are sent to State institutions or a considerable expense to juvenile court, Hogle said. It is intended to teach various crafts as well as hold classes for the children.

PLAN TO WIDEN NOBLESVILLE RD.
