

BANDIT FENCE IS GIVEN TERM

Sovetsky Engineered Huge Terre Haute Robbery.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—John Sovetsky, the alleged "million-dollar fence," whose slickness in wriggling out of trouble infuriated the authorities of two States, today was under a sentence of one to ten years in the penitentiary for receiving stolen goods.

Sovetsky was found guilty last night of possessing property stolen from Green Bay, Wis., and Terre Haute, Ind.

Police last May found \$100,000 worth of stolen property in his garage and home. Part of it was from

HELP FOR CORN GROWERS ON WAY

Two Credit Organizations to Be Formed.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—At the direction of President Coolidge and with the active aid of Agriculture Secretary Jardine, midwest bankers today started organization of credit organizations to help Iowa farmers market their corn and avert bankruptcy.

Two agencies with a total loaning power of \$5,000,000 known as the National Credit Corporations will be put in operation within ten days at Des Moines and Ft. Dodge, Iowa. Loans will be made to farmers on corn in their cribs and livestock in their pens. Farmers' notes may be rediscounted to the extent of ten times their capital at the Federal intermediate credit bank, one of which is at Omaha, Neb.

EARLY PARDON EXPECTED

Newcastle Man's Trip to State Prison Halted.

NEWCASTLE, Ind., Dec. 2.—An early pardon for Philip Blum, convicted of receiving stolen property, was expected by his attorneys today. Blum was taken to the Indiana State Prison at Michigan City Tuesday, but his clemency plea has progressed to a point where it is expected he will be liberated at an early date.

The fact that two other men convicted with him were not required to serve their sentences was made the basis for the pardon plea.

INDIANA COAL IS HANDLED BY PEOPLES FIRM

Individuality Marks New Home, Completely Designed by Owner



New Home at 41 E. Forty-Ninth St.

A house completely designed by its owner! That perhaps accounts for the charming individuality which marks the new home of Tom Barnett, 41 E. Forty-ninth St., typical English architecture. The house, situated on a rising knoll of land, is of buff, sponge-finish stucco, with window trim of white, and sloping roof of rough, variegated slate.

A chimney, unique and striking is of brick, in which are imbedded bright-colored boulders. A full terrace, with two levels is of Venetian tile, flagstone effect, and brick bordered. At one end of the terrace, white columns form an entrance, through French doors, into the living room. The other entrance of mitered brick has a handsome and unusual antique-effect lead door with a knocker, and an English shield in the art leaded glass.

This door leads into the hall, from which broad winding stairs, with hammered wrought iron railings, catch the eye to the left. At the right, through a Gothic arch, is the charmingly bright living room, with its double French doors looking out to the front and the side of the house, and a deep, satisfying brick fireplace, with imbedded boulders.

The woodwork here, as in all the downstairs, is walnut, rubbed finish. Iron Gates

Through handsome, wrought iron gates, one enters the dining room which is designed and furnished in Italian style. Leaded glass windows, in bay effect, give a flood of pleasing light here and the lighting fixtures of wrought iron are especially striking. Here, as in the living room, the walls are of soft, deep cream, contrasting pleasantly with the brown of the woodwork.

Through doors to the south, one can step onto a rear terrace, where an intriguing tile fountain, is built into the outside wall of the house. Returning to the dining room, one passes through another arched door, into a cunning little breakfast room to the left. Here also, is a serving entry and from here, coming into view, a "perfect dream" of a kitchen in green and white glazed tile. Every convenience has been installed here, with a new arrangement of a built-in ice box to the right of the sink, which of course, is filled from the outside. There are broad, low windows over the sink and one notices from here, the handsome double garage, in convenient proximity to the house.

Upstairs, the three bedrooms vie with each other for dainty beauty. In the master's bedroom, soft shades of mulberry and gray predominate, in the wall paper, the Tiffany woodwork and the cunning built-in vanity. A recess with windows, a mirrored closet door, dainty light fixtures, all distinguish this room.

The children's bedroom breathes springtime and beauty, for the walls are papered in apple blossoms and the furniture is all done in colors of tender green. The guestroom to the right is bright and cheerful and has, in common with the other upstairs rooms, two clothes closets.

The bathroom is unusual, all in sparkling, white glazed tile, with a tiled arched way over the built-in tub and a shower.

In the basement is every modern convenience, from a thermostat to a water softener. There is a complete laundry, a fruit and storeroom.
