

IMPROVEMENTS AT SUNNYSIDE ARE PROPOSED

Superintendent Will Ask
\$417,956 of County
for Project.

Improvements at Sunnyside, Marion County tuberculosis hospital, to cost \$417,956, were proposed today by Dr. H. S. Hatch, superintendent of the institution. Dr. Hatch plans to ask the county council and the county commissioners for approval of the project next month.

The improvement program calls for the following expenditures:
Nurses' home, \$131,000.
Physician's residence (assistant superintendent).

Hospital Unit
Hospital unit, \$127,720.
Remodeling administration building, \$10,000.
Additional wings on woman's ward, \$56,250.
Two cottages for employees, \$2,000.
Grading and walks, \$6,000.
Equipment, \$49,000.

Water Softeners
New boiler and automatic stokers, \$15,500.
The hospital is now caring for 180 patients. It has a waiting list of from forty to one hundred persons. Dr. Hatch estimates the proposed improvements will allow the institution to care for 240 persons.

1. While father is struggling to regain his health at Sunnyside Sanatorium, the mother and four children are trying to make both ends meet at home. A liberal basket will bring a lot of added cheer to them; also gifts for the boy of 12 and the girls of 10, 14, and 17.
2. Father has been out of work and savings are exhausted. There

are three boys 5, 7 and 9, and just Monday a baby sister arrived. The mother is doing well. Christmas dinner, gifts for the boys, and a few baby clothes are needed.

3. A widow who is ill with tuberculosis has a boy of 3 and a girl of 11. A bountiful Christmas dinner, clothing and toys for the children will bring sunshine into the home.

4. A widow with a girl of 11 and a boy of 9. Last year Times readers brought good cheer to them. Food and playthings will be appreciated.

5. An aged couple, living alone, with no children or relatives to make their holiday happy. A basket that includes a few delicacies with staple foods, and gifts for each will be welcome.

6. Two lonely women, the widowed mother with her middle-aged daughter, a cripple, have fed friends or resources. A dinner "with trimmings" and gifts would bring happiness.

7. A widow with three children, boys, aged 4 and 7, a girl 11, has no money to buy them the few gifts they crave.

8. Six dark-eyed little folks in steep steps, hoping the American Santa Claus will remember them! The father was a good craftsman in his native country, but since coming to Indianapolis has had to work

9. In basement rooms a young colored woman, a widow, has been suffering for nine weeks with rheumatic fever. She has not been able to work to support her two orphan brothers, 8 and 11, who live with her. The Family Welfare Society has come to the rescue, and asks Christmas with food, gifts and clothing.

10. A lonely couple have no money and few friends outside the Family Welfare Society. They will appreciate good food and personal gifts.

War of 1812 Vets Still on Pension Lists.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Death decreased the cost of Federal Government by more than twelve million dollars last year.

The names of 32,125 men who had fought for the United States, and their widows, were erased forever

from the Government pension rolls. But amazingly there are still on the pension rolls seventeen soldiers of the Mexican War.

And even more amazingly there are twenty-one widows of men who fought in the war of 1812, that dim historic affair, still alive and drawing monthly pensions.

Of the Civil War there are 126,566 veterans on the pension list, and widows of 241,193 others. The Spanish War has 101,702 veterans and 18,363 widows on the list.

In the fiscal year just past the United States paid out pensions amounting to \$229,994,777, a decrease of \$12,844,165 from the year before.

Since the pension system was inaugurated in 1790, the United States has paid a little more than

seven billion dollars to its veterans. Of this, six and a half billion has gone to Civil War veterans.

Last year 18,923 new Spanish War pension claims were allowed, making the net reduction in the pension list 13,202.
