

CONFERENCE ON RECLAMATION OF LAND IS BEGUN

Work Opens Meeting to Deal With Developing Arid Stretches of West.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Secretary of Interior Work today opened the national reclamation conference, which devoted its first session to problems of developing arid lands in the west and settling deserted farm lands of the east.

Secretary of Agriculture Jardine, several Senators and Congressmen and representatives of farm organizations and railways will present different aspects of the agrarian problem to the conferences.

"This conference is called to devise means for making rural life more attractive and to broaden the opportunities for settlement and farm development by people of small or moderate means," Elwood Mead, commissioner of the bureau of reclamation said.

"Its purpose is also to discuss the law enacted by Congress authorizing the appropriation of \$100,000 to investigate the possibilities of reclaiming swamp and cut-over timber lands.

"On present Federal reclamation projects about 500,000 acres of land are unirrigated, uncultivated and largely unsettled, according to data presented to the conference.

"The settlement of these lands will not only contribute to the economic and social value of the reclamation policy, but is the thing needed to improve its revenues," according to Mead.

"This situation comes from the past depression in agriculture, the high wages in industry, and the resulting movement away from the country rather than toward it."





No, it's not a revelation by modern mothers, but just one of the things that enlivens the working day for employees of cleaning and dyeing establishments in Indianapolis.

Many other things are also found in clothing. In fact, the cleaners say that returning lost articles is one of their important problems.

"There is not a day passes in which we do not find and return several articles left in the pockets of clothes sent to our shop," said Ralph Piercy, branch manager for Gregg & Son. "There are many kinds of objects found—money, rings, pins and papers being in the majority. Sometimes we find valuable articles. Recently a \$500 diamond ring was found in the pocket of a suit. The owner had left for New York, but wired us from there."

Men are worse than boys in leaving "junk" in their pockets, according to Harry Ball, Irvington cleaning shop proprietor. He exhibited a billfold containing two \$5 bills, just taken from a suit.

"We find everything from love letters to keys," said Ball. "Once a woman claimed to have left a wrist watch in some clothes. She was very indignant because we could not return it, and later found it at

home. There are a lot of good laughs in the dry cleaning game."

Officials of the French Steam Dye Works say that persons often think they leave things in clothes sent to the cleaners, and if they are not returned blame employees of the establishment. Every effort is made to return all articles, it was said.
