President Asked to Intervene in Execution.

DEFIANCE, Ohio, Dec. 14.—Mr. and Mrs. Christ Seybolt today appealed to President Coolidge to intervene in behalf of their son, Ralph W. Seybolt, 24, who faces a firing squad in Salt Lake City in June for the murder of Patrolman David H. Crowther.

A second appeal was transmitted to Congressman Charles J. Thompson, who was asked to supplement the plea with a personal appeal to the President.

FIGHT ON T. B. GETS RESULTS

Many Lives Saved in Indiana by Association.

In a little more than a dozen years the Indiana Tuberculosis Association has saved approximately 2,500 lives annually, according to figures made public today by Murray Auerbach, executive secretary.

Deaths from tuberculosis in Indiana have declined from 4,710 in 1910 to 2,520 in 1924. Auerbach pointed out in urging a wider sale of 1925 tuberculosis Christmas seals, through which next year's fight against the "white plague" will be financed.

In the last forty years it is estimated that more than 100,000,000 persons have died from the disease. Since the association's organized fight was begun in 1880 the death rate for the United States has fallen from 300 for each 100,000 persons to 94 in 1924.

GREECE ORDERED TO PAY

League Council Decision Presumably Accepted by Nations.

GENEVA, Dec. 14.—The League of Nations council today ordered Greece to pay Bulgaria a quarter of a million dollars' damages as a result of the recent Greco-Bulgarian border hostilities. The Bulgarian foreign minister, Kalkoff, accepted the council verdict. The Greek foreign minister, Rentis, merely thanked the council. Rentis' "thanks" for the verdict against his nation are presumably to be taken as Greek acceptance.
