

AUTO LISTS TO BE PREPARED

Not Very Popular With Police During 1925.

Although comparatively few of the 1925 lists of Indiana automobile owners were sold to local police officials, plans are being laid for preparation of the 1926 list, as provided by law, it was announced today by Frederick E. Schortemeier, secretary of State.

Under the Nejd law, an appropriation of \$10,000 was allowed each year for preparation of the lists, thought then to be needed in proper enforcement of the State motor laws. Schortemeier found the appropriation far short of the cost of printing such a list, so he had the lists transcribed and mimeographed. In this way he was able to save approximately \$2,000 of the allowance.

Police, however, did not take to the voluminous lists with much enthusiasm and most of them have been stored in the basement of the Statehouse, being of no further use, now that the 1926 license plates are being sold.

Schortemeier explained today that, although the prospects point to a repetition of this year's experience, new lists will be prepared in accordance with the law. He said the same system would be followed in 1926 as during 1925 in preparing the lists and that an effort would be

SENATOR JONES IS PERSISTENT

Will Put His Tariff Bill in Hopper Again.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Senator A. A. Jones of New Mexico has laid

before the Senate a plan to take the tariff out of politics and put it on a scientific basis.

The measure has been put before Congress before and has met with scant attention. Yet Jones continues to introduce it because, he says, he believes in it.

The Jones bill would make the United States Tariff Commission into a real fact-finding body, broaden its powers, give it an additional million dollars with which to carry on investigations of tariff relations, com-

mercial treaties, economic alliances and so forth.

And then it would take the tariff-finding power from the President and give it to this body.

Under the present law the tariff commission is authorized to report its findings on any subject to the President, who may then act on the report or disregard it just as he chooses. If he desires to act, he may alter tariff duties up to 50 per cent of their present rate.

But sometimes the President does

not act on the commission's recommendations. The pigeon-holed report on sugar tariffs of a year ago is a case in point.
