

PROSPERITY OF FARMS A MYTH, SAYS THOMPSON

new President of Federation Sees Improvement Coming, However.

CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—Agriculture is far from the high state of prosperity so generally ascribed to it, Sam H. Thompson, newly elected president of the American Farm Bureau Federation declared today.

"There was improvement in 1925, but this fell far short of general agricultural prosperity," Thompson said.

Agriculture is not receiving a fair share of the national income, he declared.

Sales Mostly Forced

"Riding out in the country, one sees unpainted buildings, wearing down the capital plant and equipment," Thompson continued. "That means one thing—an unbalanced economic life. Over one-half of the farm sales in Illinois last year were forced sales.

"A similar report comes from Iowa.

"However, there has been some improvement. There has been an increase in the price of certain commodities. In some sections there has been quite a large increase over last year.

Improvement Seen


"Taking the situation nationally, reports at the national headquarters of the bureau indicate that the crop year from July 1925 to June 1926, will show some slight improvement. Our reports indicate that the agriculture income in twenty-five States will show improvement. Eleven States will be about the same as last year, while twelve States will show a decrease. The brightest promise for the coming year seems to be in Maine, Mississippi, Louisiana and Idaho.

"In Maine the potato growers will realize a large gain over last year. In Louisiana, sugar cane and cotton, and in Mississippi cotton offers a larger income to farmers. The Idaho people are offered an increase through an improvement in livestock prices.

Dairy Outlook Good

"In the central States, 1926 offers very little promise. The Illinois farmer will get very little, if any more than last year. In Minnesota 1926 does not promise as much as 1925. Wisconsin, Iowa, Missouri and Indiana will show some slight improvement. The dairy outlook and the improvement of livestock income will give the farmers of these States a little more money than they had last year.


OLD NOTE COSTS DURBIN
