

ONE-WAY AUTO TRAFFIC RULE IS CHAMPIONED

Motor Club Manager Disagrees With Schortemeier.

Sentiment is decidedly in favor of one-way traffic on Meridian St. during rush hours, Todd Stoops, Hoo-
sier Motor Club manager, said to-
day.

Frederick E. Schortemeier, Secre-
tary of State, Saturday said he had
received complaints on the present
plan and would confer with Arthur
L. Gilliom, attorney general, to see
if Gilliom had authority to act
against it.

Few Accidents

Accidents pointed out there have been
few accidents on Meridian since the
one-way traffic rule became effective
at rush hours.

The recent accident at Meridian
and Michigan Sts., when a school
teacher was killed was because some
one paid no attention to the stop
sign and was not due to one-way
traffic," he said.

"Progressive cities are adopting
the one-way plan and it is working
splendidly. I believe the board of
safety was within its rights in cre-
ating the traffic law," he said.

Helps Drain Traffic

The plan helps drain traffic from
the congested district at the proper
time. Capacity of the street is prac-
tically doubled.

"The safe driver is the one who
keeps control of his car at all times.
He must realize the responsibility
that goes with driving a car and
exercise common sense," Stoops said.

G. M. Williams, Nordyke & Mar-
mon president, today wrote Ernest L.
Kingston, board of safety presi-
dent, protesting the proposed aban-
donment of the one-way plan.

"The one-way plan is the most
sensible thin Indianapolis ever
had. Recent accidents are not at-
tributable to it. A very careful sur-
vey of the situation should be made
before abandonment of the plan,"
Williams said.

Stop "Yokels"

Williams said the job of motorcy-
cle officers should be to keep the
motorists from exceeding twenty-
five miles an hour and to prevent
"yokels" from driving against traffic.

Kingston said he had heard nothing
but favorable command on the plan.

"Because a few fellows take ad-
vantage of the system is no reason
it should be abandoned," Kingston
said.

Oscar Wise, board of safety sec-
retary, said no complaints had been
received at the board office.

M'QUIGG AT NEWCASTLE

Pledges Legion Support for Uni-
versal Draft Law.

NEWCASTLE, Ind., Dec. 21.—The
national organization of the Ameri-
can Legion today was pledged to
continue its fight for a universal
service act which would conscript
money and resources as well as man
power in time of war.

John R. McQuigg, national com-
mander, declared the Legion would
use all its influence to have the bill
passed at the present session of Con-
gress in an address to former service
men here.

"The burden of future wars must
not be borne by the few as in the
past," McQuigg said. "Capital and
industry must stand their share."
