One lb. oleomargarine, 1 cup light brown sugar, 1 cup white sugar, 3 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup nut meats, 1 level teaspoon soda, flour to knead stiff. Roll in long rolls. Put into refrigerator over night. Cut in thin slices and bake.

Three cups cooked macaroni, 2 pintos, 1 sliced onion, 2 dill pickles, 1 cup shredded cabbage, 1 cup diced celery, salt and paprika to taste. Cut pintos in small pieces and dill pickles very fine. Mix all ingredients with mayonnaise dressing and serve very cold.

POTATO CAKE

Two cups sugar, 1 cup butter, 4 whole eggs, 3 cups flour, 1 heaping teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup mashed potatoes, 1 teaspoon each of cinnamon and cloves, 1/2-cup of cocoa, 1 cup ground English walnuts, 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla or lemon extract, 1 cup milk. Cream butter and sugar, add beaten eggs and mashed potatoes. Sift flour and baking powder together. Add milk and cocoa dissolved in a little warm water. Add the rest of the ingredients, stirring all the time. Bake in a moderate oven. Icing: Boil 2 cups granulated sugar in a half

cup of water till it threads. Have one egg white beaten stiff, with 1/2-teaspoon cream of tartar. Pour over syrup and beat till cool. Spread over cake.
