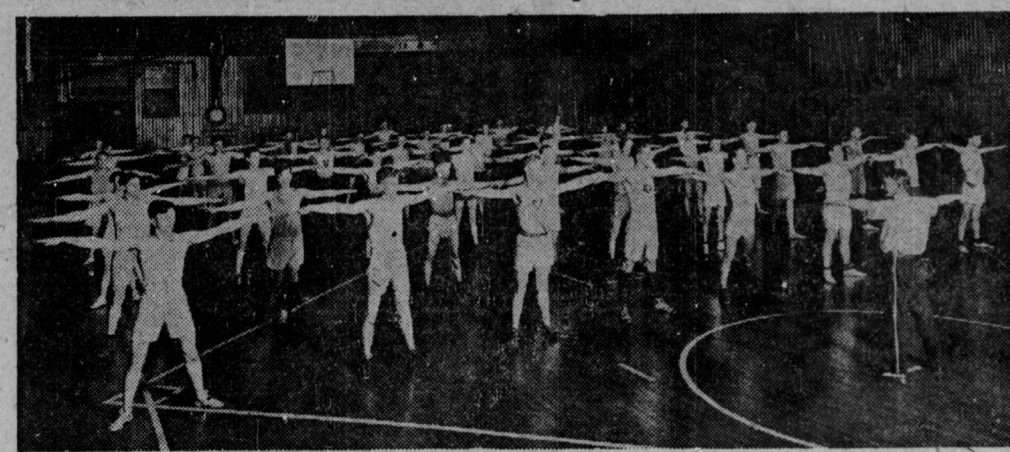
Rain Here Weighed 134,965,000 Tons

One hundred and thirty-four million, nine hundred and sixty-five thousand tons of rain.

That was the weight Indianapolis suffered during 1925. One inch of rain over an acre weighs 133 tons. There are 31,680 acres in the corporate limits of the city. Thus for each inch of rain there was a weight of 3,579,840.

Now the United States weather bureau reports 37.45 inches of rain fell this year. Folling your own arithmetic, you have 134,965,000 tons for the year.

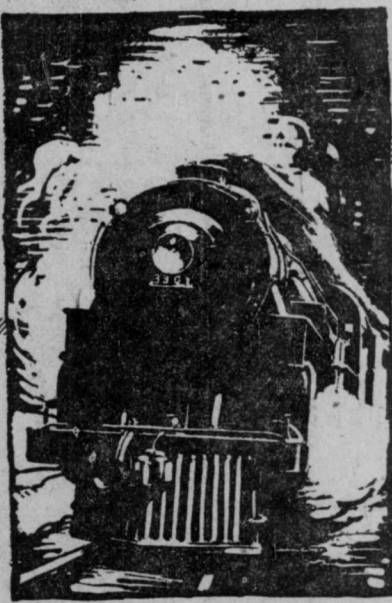

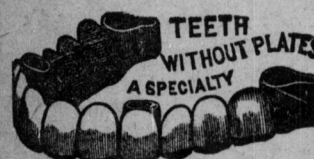
