15 WILL START ON LONG TRIP

To Leave for Penitentiary
Monday.

Fifteen men sentenced Wednesday
by Federal Judge Robert C. Baltzell
in the Jack Daniel liquor conspiracy
case, will be taken to the Federal
penitentiary at Leavenworth at 2 p.
m., Monday. The remaining eight,
who received jail sentences began
serving their terms Wednesday in the
Marion County jail.

Don Robinson, one of the twenty-
five defendants found guilty, was
discharged by Judge Baltzell and
Michael J. Kinney, State Senator
living at St. Louis, was granted a
motion for new trial.

All other new trial motions and
arrests in judgments were overruled

by the court. Attorneys for some
of the defendants announced they
would appear before the United
States Circuit Court of Appeals at
Chicago and ask for supersedeas
writs.

The sentences given by the court
ranged from thirty days in jail with-
out fines or costs to five sentences
of two years and \$5,000 fines.
