NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Dec. 31.—After three postponements the Lee Kincadie murder case will be called for trial at Tipton Monday. The defendant is charged with killing his father James J. Kincadie by hitting him over the head with a piece of gas pipe. The elder Kincadie was a wealthy farmer near here, the case being venued to Tipton County.

At the first trial here the son was convicted of manslaughter, but Judge Hines granted a new trial.
