

HOSTELRY MAY BE PADLOCKED

Prosecutor Plans Closing
Liberty Beach Place.

Prosecutor William H. Remy today announced he would take steps to close the Liberty Beach hotel, north of Broad Ripple, for one year after Frank Buchanan, its owner, was found guilty of maintenance of a nuisance Monday afternoon by Criminal Judge James A. Collins. Buchanan was fined \$250 and costs and sentenced thirty days in jail.

Buchanan was arrested after George Snider, former sheriff and deputies, raided the hotel Oct. 11, 1924. Sixteen bottles of liquor were confiscated.

Buchanan denied ownership of the liquor and knowledge of law violation.
