

## THIRD S. H. S. SITE MAY BE BEFORE BOARD

Location at Forty-Ninth  
and Meridian Sts.  
Offered.

A third site for the new Shortridge High School will be considered at the Indianapolis school board meeting tonight, Theodore Vonnegut, president, said today.

The site, 600 by 500 feet, is at Forty-Ninth and Meridian Sts., and has been offered to the board, he said.

Appraised values of two other proposed sites, one on Forty-Sixth St., between Central Ave. and Washington Blvd., and another on Forty-First St., between Illinois and Meridian Sts., may be announced at the meeting.

The results of the reappraisal of the tract now held as a site for the new school at Thirty-Fourth and Meridian Sts. will be given. It was appraised at \$107,000 last fall by the Indianapolis Real Estate Board. The board plans to sell this and buy a larger tract.

County commissioners have promised the board they will try to procure a site for School 37 at Keystone Ave. and Twenty-Fifth St.

Vonnegut, Charles W. Kern, and Business Director Ure M. Frazer, conferred in Frazer's office this

morning. The nature of the conference was not divulged.

Vonnegut remarked that if the board did not find a suitable site soon that Shortridge will be erected on the Thirty-Fourth St. site.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Ten children were among the forty-five patients rescued early today from the Bay Ridge Sanitarium, destroyed by fire.

One man was on the operating table when the blaze began, but surgeons completed their work and the patient was wrapped in blankets and taken through a driving snow storm to the nurses' home next door.

Many of the women in the hospital were maternity cases and police received a report that three babies were born during the excitement.
