

### MAY REDUCE LIGHT RATES

Commission Investigates Anderson Petition.

Sharp rate reductions for Anderson municipal electric light plant patrons appeared today as a possible outcome of the public service commission's investigation of a petition of the city to borrow \$50,000 from the light fund surplus.

Although the present surplus is only \$73,621.79, city officials anticipate an increase during the next few months sufficient to meet the loan, needed in the general fund. Hearing on the petition was conducted Monday by John S. Powell, commission chief accountant. The majority of the commission is said to believe rates are excessive.
