

## 171 PETITIONING PARDON BOARD FOR CLEMENCY

Twenty-Two New Pleas Are  
Filed for Local  
Persons.

Names of 171 prisoners in State penal and correctional institutions appear today on the list of applicants for executive clemency, whose pleas will be heard by the State pardon board beginning Monday.

New petition number 113, including twenty-two pleas for local persons. Of the fifty-eight reopened cases, fourteen are for local applicants. Sixteen life prisoners are seeking clemency.

Applicants  
Among local applicants whose cases are to be heard for the first time are:

Olvan Ammon, three to five years, reformatory, vehicle taking, Jordan Walker, life, State Prison, murder; William D. Walters, two to five years, State Prison, forgery; Norman Knauer, one to five years, reformatory, forgery; Allen Parlow, three to five years, reformatory, vehicle taking; Ted E. Horn, ten to twenty years, State Prison, robbery; Sanders, two to five years, Woman's Prison, manslaughter; Earl J. Harman, one to five years, reformatory, grand larceny; Clarence Jobe, one to five years, reformatory, grand larceny; Roy M. Lucas, twenty-one years, reformatory, robbery; transferred to State Prison.

Life Sentence  
Oldham Hayden, life, State Prison, murder; Nathan James, one to four years, reformatory, grand larceny; Charles M. Williams, one to five years, State Prison, while under influence of liquor; Lois Harman, six months, Woman's Prison, child neglect; Carl Stiles, one to five years, State Prison, violating liquor laws; Oliver J. Jamison, one to two years, State Prison, violating liquor laws; Charles Kurtz, five to fourteen years, reformatory, robbery, now in State Prison; Elmer Clark, two to four years, reformatory, assault with intent to kill; Morris Denton, one to four years, State Prison, grand larceny.

Cases of the following persons now serving life sentences in State prison were reopened: Joe Dietrick, Thomas V. Shouse and Frank Randall.

Other local cases to be re-heard: Joseph Lee, Harry Ragdale, William Miller, Arthur O. Schmidt, Van Kesterson, Vinton Mingle, Russell Smith, Charles Ketterman, Willard Whitehill and Ben Reeves.

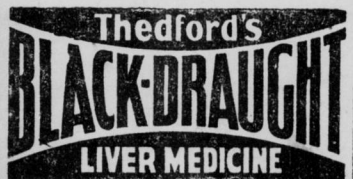

## POLICEMEN MAY APPEAL CASES

Judge Miller Rules Against  
Shank Appointees.

Patrick J. McCormick, attorney, today announced he probably would appeal to the State Supreme Court, the ruling of Judge Sidney S. Miller of Superior Court Three, Tuesday, in favor of the board of safety in ousting three patrolmen from the police department. Motion made by Don Roberts, assistant city attorney, claimed McCormick failed to state a cause of action, to prove any allegations and that board did not act in good faith.

The ousted men who sought reinstatement are John Sheehan, Michael Keating and James Scully, Shank administration appointees. The hearing was to allow the board to give reason why it should not obey an alternative writ issued last week ordering the board to reinstate the men. The men were dismissed Jan. 4, on grounds the department had insufficient funds.

"As a matter of fact I feel sorry for these men," said Judge Miller. "They went on the force in good faith, but there has been no showing that the board did not act in good faith."

Bus Lines Bought  
Though the firm is in receivership, it recently bought the Hoosier Stage bus lines and several Red Ball bus lines. It is coordinating fares on a three-cent a mile basis on both the bus and electric lines.

Arthur W. Brady, receiver, intends to make good the same tickets on either buses or interurbans where both serve the same territory. More buses are to be used as feeders. Brady forecast these expansions upon the recent occasion of starting \$500,000 worth of new rolling stock purchased through cooperation of the Fletcher American Company.

Since starting this equipment, which included specially built parlor-buffet cars, Brady also has undertaken expansion of the firm's express and freight business.
