Effect Will Be Greater Than Teapot or Daugherty Inquiries, Fear.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—A contract for carrying mail from Chicago to Birmingham, Ala., through Indianapolis will be let "any day" to the National Airways System, Lomas, Ill. Postmaster General New's office announced today.

ONE AMERICAN IN EVERY SIX HAS AUTO NOW

More Than 20,000,000 Cars Owned in U. S.—New York First.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—There is now one motor car in the United States for every 5.8 persons. The Department of Agriculture reports. Registrations in 1925 increased 13.4 per cent.

There were 20,051,000 cars, including those used by State and Federal Governments, and not registered.

New York has the most registrations, 1,625,582, but California is a close second with 1,400,541. California has one auto to every 2.9 persons, far more proportionately than any other State.

Florida registration increased the most during the year, 46.8 per cent, and Utah, Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, North Dakota and Texas all report increases of more than 20 per cent.

Alabama has only one auto for each twelve persons, the lowest per capita number in the country, despite the large increase in registration.

Total collections from registration fees and permits, etc., during the year were \$26,619,621, of which \$17,706,000 was available for State roads, \$19,124,000 for State roads and \$48,396,471 for local roads.
