

WEAF TO GIVE EASTER SUNDAY RADIO PROGRAM

New York Oratorio Society Will Broadcast Best Compositions.

The Easter Sunday radio program under the auspices of A. Water Kent of Philadelphia will be presented by the New York Oratorio Society, with Albert Stoessel conducting. The concert, including the best compositions of the old masters, will be given at 9:15 p. m. (Eastern Time), from Station WEAF and fourteen connected stations.

The Oratorio Society of New York ranks among the first of the choral organizations. It was founded in 1875, by Dr. Leopold Damrosch, father of Dr. Walter and Dr. Frank Damrosch, and has had but five conductors, including the elder and younger Damrosches, and Stoessel, who has directed the past four years.

Stoessel is a native of St. Louis, and a graduate of the Royal Academic High School of Berlin. The earlier part of his career was devoted entirely to concertizing as violin soloist in Europe and America, culminating in a tour with Enrico Caruso, covering the principal cities of the United States. He is also an orchestral conductor of the highest distinction, and will lead the New York Symphony Orchestra for the fifth consecutive season at Chautauqua, this summer.

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

BETTERING OF METAL TRADES IS DISCUSSED

Annual Banquet of Indianapolis Branch of Association Held.

Ways of bettering labor conditions in industry and particularly in the metal trades were discussed by speakers at the twentieth annual banquet of the Indianapolis branch of the National Metal Trades Association at the Claypool Wednesday night.

Mrs. Marguerite B. Benson of Chicago, director of the Woman's Bureau of the Illinois Manufacturers Association, stressed the importance of women's place in the industrial scheme of this country. Contrary to popular opinion, "In many instances woman's environment in the average factory is much better than in her own home," Mrs. Benson declared.

Mrs. Benson advocated constructive and intelligent legislation for the betterment of labor conditions. She advised backing the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. the Boy Scout and Girl Scout movements in order to improve the factory workers.

"The American woman in the factory is efficient and businesslike. She is proud of her place in the industry," Mrs. Benson said.

H. A. Frommell of the Falk Corporation of Milwaukee discussed the labor problem from the standpoint of training the apprentice boy in the shop. He praised highly the plan of allowing the boys to go from one shop to another during their training. "It is time to stop making boys and to train men," he said.

Horner D. Sayre, National Metal Trades Association commissioner, and Harold C. Smith of the Illinois Tool Works, Chicago, also talked.

CAN AMERICAN BE WITHOUT COUNTRY?

Question Probably Will Arise When Eugene V. Debs, Hoosier Socialist, Returns From Bermuda.

General Sergeant asking the latter to state his authority for the "assumption" that Debs is not a citizen.

Debs is in Bermuda with Mrs. Debs, who is ill.

When Debs returns, the controversy as to his citizenship rights will be precipitated if usual formalities of the United States Immigration authorities are carried out.

Debs has no passport. To go to Bermuda none is necessary.

May Be Kept Out

But returning, he will be questioned by the immigration department as to his citizenship, and not being a citizen of this or any other country, may be denied entrance to the country of his birth and his lifetime residence, under present laws.

Then recourse to the courts will be had.

Debs served thirty-two months in Federal prison following his espionage act conviction. Then President Harding freed him. But Harding granted him only commutation of the remainder of his sentence, not a pardon.

One President after another has granted "restoration of citizenship" to persons convicted of violating Federal laws.

In the case of Debs, two Presidents and a sundry attorney generals have on many occasions stated the opinion he enjoyed no citizenship rights following his conviction in 1918 for violation of the wartime espionage act.
